

Shots Hurt 3 Men Here in Speeding Car

Occupants Arrested On South Side

Three men in a speeding car were captured by police early today after a wild chase through South Side streets at 75 miles an hour.

The speeding car was caught in the 2200 block, Shelby St., after Patrolmen James R. Gates and Chalmier Byrne fired two shots at the men.

While cruising at Raymond and Shelby Sts., the officers saw a car speed past them and run a red light.

Officers Open Fire

At the sound of the police car's siren the motorist opened his throttle full speed, zig-zagging around corners. Both officers opened fire with their pistols and the car swerved off Shelby St. into a front yard at 2201 Shelby St. and stopped.

Three men in the car gave their names as Lawrence Tabor, 42, and John Tabor, 18, both of 525 E. Troy Ave., and John Thorp, 21, of 533 Martin St.

Attempt to Escape

After the officers put the men in the police car, the two Tabors began fighting back and tried to escape.

The elder Tabor was charged with reckless driving, drunk and resisting officers. The younger Tabor was charged with drunkenness and resisting officers. Thorp was charged with vagrancy.


