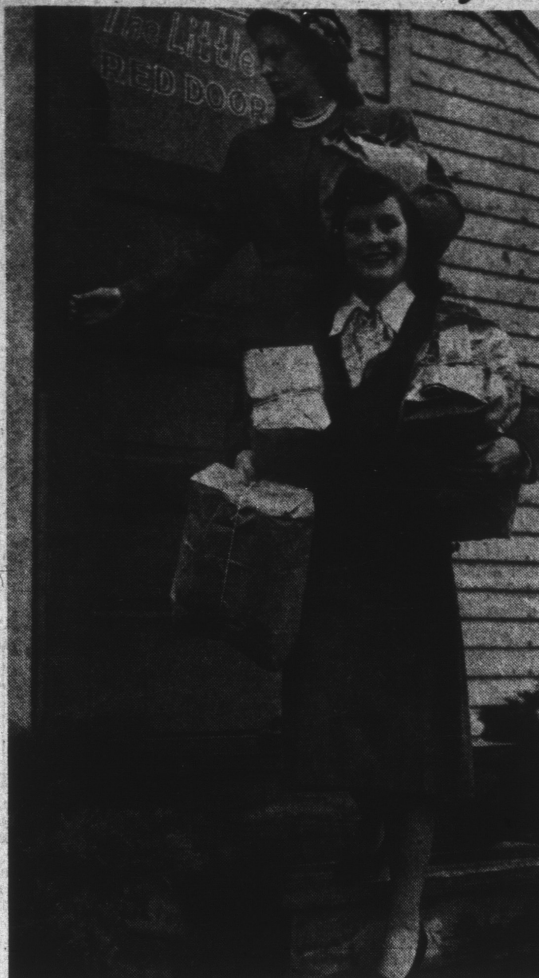
New officers will be elected at the meeting and there will be a tea and social hour.
