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County Board Hit By GOP Candidates

Kincaid Says Waste Bogs Institutions

Grayson Charges Highway Neglect

A double-barreled attack against County Commissioners was made by two candidates before the Irvington Republican Club last night.

George E. Kincaid, candidate for the GOP nomination for County Commissioner, first district, charged that "Marion County's institutions have bogged down completely due to waste and inefficiency."

"It is high time that the taxpayers of Marion County wake up and help us clean up the mess," Mr. Kincaid said.

"I am running for this office as a duty to taxpayers to see that they get full value for every dollar spent in county government."

The candidate pledged that if elected he would reorganize the County Home, to insure proper care and food for the community's indigent aged persons.

Road System Hit

"The preparation of food at Julietta has been a scandal for several years," he said. "It's time we as citizens do something about it."

Mr. Kincaid is running for the first district GOP nomination against William T. Ayres, who is serving his third term as Commissioner.

In another speech, Arthur W. Grayson, candidate for the GOP nomination for Commissioner, third district, charged that "lack of proper supervision has caused a general breakdown in Marion County's highway system."

"The present administration is not using proper materials on gravel roads," declared Mr. Grayson, who is now a subdistrict road supervisor for the State Highway Commission.

He charged that the county's ditches are getting into "deplorable condition" as the result of improper planning and the use of the wrong type of materials.

Mr. Grayson is running for the nomination against Ray Mendenhall of Camby.

Urges Auxiliary Corps Of Science Workers

PRINCETON, N. J., Apr. 13 (UP)—Dr. Henry D. Smyth, author of the Atomic Energy Report, today urged the creation of an auxiliary corps to keep young men in scientific jobs in case of war.

Dr. Smyth, physics department chairman at Princeton University and former associate director of the Chicago Atomic Bomb Laboratory, said such a corps "must not be military in nature."

OK Sought For FM Tower

Scripps-Howard Radio Asks Zone Variance

Scripps-Howard Radio, Inc., today sought a variance from the county zoning board for erection of a 600-foot tower for a frequency modulation station in Indianapolis.

The structure would be located at 62d St. and Rucker Road. The tower, which would support antenna for FM Station WYNA, would be 1400 feet above sea level and would be the tallest structure in this vicinity.

Station WYNA, to be operated by Scripps-Howard Radio, Inc., affiliated with The Indianapolis Times, is expected to begin operations late this year. Scripps-Howard Radios at present operate television and FM stations in Cleveland, O., and stations in Cincinnati, O., and Knoxville, Tenn. The corporation now is building television and FM stations in Cincinnati and an FM station in Knoxville.

Crosley Asks Variance

Appearing before the Zoning Board will be M. C. Watters, vice president of Scripps-Howard Radio, Inc.

The zoning board also will hear the request of Crosley Broadcasting Corp. for a variance to erect a television station in the 62d and Rucker Road area, north-east of Indianapolis.

Request by the Indianapolis Power & Light Co. for erection of a substation at 18th St. and Arlington Ave.

Request by J. Homer Dady and Grace R. Dady for the construction of 22 two-family residences on Roena St. north of W. Washington St.

Helmke Selects Campaign Chief

Walter Helmke, Ft. Wayne candidate for the Republican nomination for governor, today named John K. Ruckelshaus, Indianapolis attorney, as his campaign manager.

Mr. Ruckelshaus is a member of the Governor's Crime Commission which is recodifying Indiana's criminal code. He is a veteran of World War I, a former deputy attorney general, and local chairman of the Great Books Foundation sponsored by the University of Chicago.

Helmke-for-Governor headquarters was set up recently in Room 625 at the Claypool Hotel. Mr. Helmke is one of four Republican Party leaders actively seeking the nomination for governor at the state GOP convention June 11.

Three Drivers Die In Flaming Wreck

Three drivers died in a flaming crash of two trucks and an automobile near Chesterton in Porter County last night.

Three other persons were killed in two other accidents.

State police believe the accident near Chesterton occurred when Mrs. Marie Louise Fleschy, 65, of Beverly Shores, Ind., started to make a left turn off Road 49 onto Road 20.

One truck swerved to avoid crashing into the automobile and struck another truck and both trailers overturned on the automobile and burst into flames.

Car Strikes Tree

Drivers of the trucks were Ross Pratt, 34, of Morocco, and Earl Sanders, 29, of Elkhart.

The bodies of both truck drivers and Mrs. Fleschy were crushed and burned beyond recognition.

Two Mishawaka youths were killed today when their car crashed into a tree at Niles, Mich.

Russell L. Ficus, 21, driver of the car, was killed outright and Gerald Dale, 20, died later in a hospital. Jack Markin was listed as critically injured and Richard Stahl as seriously injured in the crash.

Car Hits Truck

Mrs. Alta M. Anderson, 50, of near Ft. Wayne, was killed instantly last night when she was struck by a car driven by Walter E. Seagly of Topeka, Ind. The accident occurred on Highway 30, two miles west of Ft. Wayne.

Lester Sanders, 52, of 3524 Martindale Ave., was critically injured last night when his car skidded into a parked truck in the 2800 block, Martindale Ave. His right leg was badly crushed and mangled.

James Sadowski, 24, of 637 Buchanan St., and Miss Delta Hall, 17, of 1031 S. Alabama St., were injured last night when the truck in which they were riding was struck by a car driven by Rufus Dordill, 22, of 2228 Park Ave.

The accident occurred in the 4000-block, Madison Ave.

Court, Prosecutor Friction Rapped

Fairchild Pledges Close Co-operation

Friction between the prosecutor's office and the courts was condemned by Frank H. Fairchild, candidate for the Republican nomination for prosecutor, in a speech before the Irvington GOP Club last night.

Mr. Fairchild referred to the report of the Indianapolis Bar Association which described as "deplorable" the recent conflict between Prosecutor Judson L. Stark and Judge W. D. Bain of Criminal Court 1.

"One of the main points of my program is closer co-operation with the courts to avoid the unfortunate spectacle of the prosecutor's office being reprimanded for courtroom misbehavior," Mr. Fairchild said.

The candidate is opposing Prosecutor Stark for the GOP nomination for that office.

Protest Dismissal Of Five Workers

Dismissal of five workers and the demotion of an inspector at the City Sanitation plant was protested by the Municipal Workers Union (AFL) before the City Sanitation Board today.

Ed Dailey, of Chicago, spokesman for the union, asked for an explanation and a hearing on the dismissals and demotion.

Board Chairman James F. Cunningham said the workers would be given a formal hearing if they appeared in person before the members.

Mr. Cunningham said three of the five workers were dismissed because of their police records. The inspector, demoted to the day worker ranks, was Bert Pike.

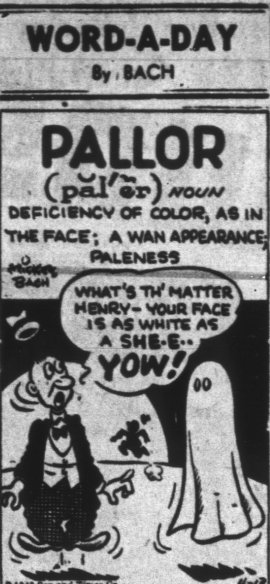

PEIPING, Apr. 13 (UP)—Government dispatches from Hopei Province said today that 2000 Communists were killed in heavy fighting at Pingchuan, 70 miles east of Chengteh, by Chinese infantry and air force attacks.

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Foundation Gains Support For Canterbury College

Trustees Reverse Earlier Decision to Withdraw Church Financial Aid to Danville Institution

Establishment of the Canterbury Foundation was today credited with influencing the Episcopal Church to continue its support of Canterbury College at Danville.

The foundation was planned last week to raise a support fund for the institution after the school trustees had voted to withdraw church support.

Canterbury trustees met last night in the Columbia Club and reversed their previous decision.

At the same time it was announced that the Rev. Douglas Robert McLaury, director of St. John's Episcopal Church in Chicago, has resigned and will become vice president of Canterbury. He will direct financial promotions and public relations.

Dr. Edgar Cummings, college president, announced last week he would resign at the close of the school year to become dean of DePaul University.

The Rt. Rev. R. A. Kirchhoffer, bishop of the Indianapolis Episcopal Diocese and a Canterbury trustee, said the board had voted to continue church support last night in the light of a clearer financial outlook.

The foundation was to be in College Ave., and Kroger Co. permission to construct an off-street parking lot on the site of a double house in 23-25 Johnson Ave.
