

Ohio River Nears Crest From Aurora To New Albany

Mild Weather Slows Peak Of Floods

Newport, Ky., Still Facing Threat

The Ohio River in southern Indiana was slated to crest at all points from Aurora to New Albany today as the stream was slowed down by mild spring weather.

Weather observers reported that the river crested at Madison yesterday at a height of 56 feet. The crest came hours behind schedule, however, they said.

However, residents of Newport, Ky., continued their round-the-clock battle to save their city from the Ohio and Licking Rivers even though the two streams appeared to be retreating.

Although the worst appeared to be over, officials said the fight by Newport residents and soldiers from Camp Campbell and Ft. Knox, Ky., would go on until all danger of a break in a sandbag dike was over.

Half Mile Long

The dike, now 11 feet high and one-half mile long, was hurriedly thrown up by a small army of men, women and children and 500 Army troops when the surging waters threatened to inundate 30 blocks in the city and flood 1000 homes.

The weather bureau at Cincinnati said the river began dropping last night after it had crested at 64.8 feet at 7 a. m. yesterday morning. It fell to 64.8 feet by midnight and forecasters said it probably would continue to fall until it reached the 52-foot flood mark late Friday.

Meanwhile, the river was expected to reach its peak at New Albany and Jeffersonville early today. The stream crested at Aurora at 64.5 feet yesterday and began to fall slowly.

Showers Forecast

Indiana Adjutant General Howard Maxwell said that National Guardsmen still were on the alert in the flooded area. Cheers went up at Aurora as news came that the Ohio had reached its crest. More than 125 families were evacuated from their homes and were living in tents during the emergency.

Brief showers forecast for this afternoon were not expected to affect river stages.

Mr. Hibbs is from Chillicothe, O., and Mr. Walford from San Diego, Cal. They were using the same system today that they used last year. They worked it out while they were students at the University of Chicago.

The men start their play by watching a particular wheel for a long period, noting the frequency of numbers in a little black book.

Model's Body Found in Lake At Evanston

Murder Possibility Checked by Police

EVANSTON, Ill., Apr. 19 (UP)—Detectives sought to learn today whether a 25-year-old Marilyn Roble, a former Powers model, committed suicide or was murdered.

The attractive blonde's body was found Sunday in Lake Michigan. She was clad only in a brassiere.

Lt. Hubert Kelsch of the Evanston police department said that "as the case stands now we have clues that point both ways—to murder and to suicide."

Miss Roble had been reported missing Thursday by her fiancé, Richard Tobias, 25, a Northwestern University student. The girl's mother, Mrs. Grace Roble, had come from Minneapolis to aid in the search for the girl.

Found by Children

Two children discovered the body between the pilings of a pier. A pair of black panties that matched the filmy brassiere were found clinging to the pilings.

Police experts said it would be difficult to tell how long the body had been in the water.

Police learned that Miss Roble became ill and went home from work early last Wednesday.

Tobias said he saw Miss Roble Wednesday night and that she seemed "perfectly all right" then.

The 41-year-old dentist collects pistols. Yesterday, he dropped a gun into a tavern to show the owner a brand new .45 caliber automatic he had just bought.

While they were examining the weapon, a bandit identified as Sol Klein, 30, entered and showed a gun into the tavern owner's back. Faillo wheeled and fired his pistol. The slugs struck Klein in the head and chest. He died later at a hospital.

Faillo was not held.

Mayor Stays Clear Of Party Setup

McDuff 'On His Own'; Worker Poll Ordered

Mayor Feeney continued his hands-off policy toward the Democratic county organization today and said new County Chairman Paul McDuff was "on his own."

Mr. McDuff's first official action after his election at a special county convention in April, was to instruct ward and precinct party officials to poll their workers on candidates in the May primary. He made it clear that no so-called "state" is official as of now and that the slate will be voted on by party officials, probably within 10 days.

"Really Mean That"

Mr. McDuff said this morning. "The precinct committee men and women and ward chairmen and vice chairmen will vote on which candidates for nomination are to be slated. Nobody's going to tell them now to vote except the people in their own wards and precincts."

Election of Mr. McDuff simply made official a situation that has existed since Mayor Feeney's election. Mr. McDuff has served as a clearing house for all city hall patronage appointments.

Boatman By-Passed

Former county Chairman Walter Boetner was by-passed in all city hall patronage matters and Mr. McDuff has been performing the functions of a county chairman for months.

Mr. McDuff said he would make no attempt to appoint a successor to Sheldon Book who resigned as district chairman at Saturday's meeting. He said appointment of a new district chairman would be held up until the regular county reorganization after the May 4 primary.

Local GI and Buddy Held On Charge of Stoning Russ

Pfc. John R. Murphy, Friend Are Also Accused of Cursing Officers on Reich Duty

An Indianapolis soldier unhappy with overseas service and a companion are being held today in Frankfurt, Germany, on charges of stoning and cursing members of a Russian military mission. The Indianapolis soldier, 20-year-old Pfc. John R. Murphy, 527 Dorman St., is a graduate of Technical High School and has been overseas for the past two years. His companion in the incident was Corp. Robert Osoinski, 19, Perth Amboy, N. J.

U. S. Officer Apologizes

Maj. Gen. Miller S. White, chief of staff of U. S. forces in Europe, personally apologized for the incident which occurred Saturday night when the two soldiers smashed their way into quarters attached to a Soviet office dealing with restitution problems.

According to a United Press dispatch Maj. Vasil Ignatiev of the Soviet mission told American authorities that Cpl. Osoinski threw a rock at him through a window, narrowly missing the Russian and another officer. The Russian said that Cpl. Osoinski and Pfc. Murphy then used profane and abusive language and refused to leave the Russian establishment until American military police arrived.

The Russians said that Cpl. Osoinski accosted them and "did everything in his power to cause trouble, being insulting, swearing and attempting to get us into a fight."

"Tried to Calm Him"

A U. S. Army spokesman quoted Ignatiev as saying "we did our best to calm him down."

"We explained our relative ranks to him," the Russians were quoted. "But he replied he did not care what our ranks were and that he hated the Russians."

Pfc. Murphy is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Hilary L. Murphy of Dorman St. address. One of seven children, he entered the Army in September 1945 and is now assigned to a graves registration team, the 770th European Mortuary.

Chiang Is Elected China's President

NANKING, Apr. 19 (UP)—

Generalissimo Chiang Kai-shek, who has guided China's destiny since the death of Sun Yat Sen, today was elected by an overwhelming majority as the country's first constitutional president.

Over-riding the generalissimo's own appeal that "someone else be given the honor," delegates to the national assembly cast 2430 votes for Chiang and 289 for Chu Cheng, president of the Judicial Yuan. Balloting was secret.

Chiang had been president pro tempore since Sept. 13, 1945, when the Central Executive Committee of the Kuomintang elected him to serve until the designation of a constitutional president. He was re-elected Oct. 10, 1946.

PLANE HITS HORSE, CRASHES

RAPID CITY, S. D., Apr. 19 (UP)—

Authorities said today that two Air Force enlisted men who were killed in the crash of a private plane apparently had "buzzed" a herd of horses and struck one of the herd with a wing tip. The rented plane crashed and burned, starting a 20-acre grass fire.

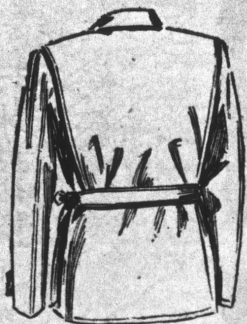

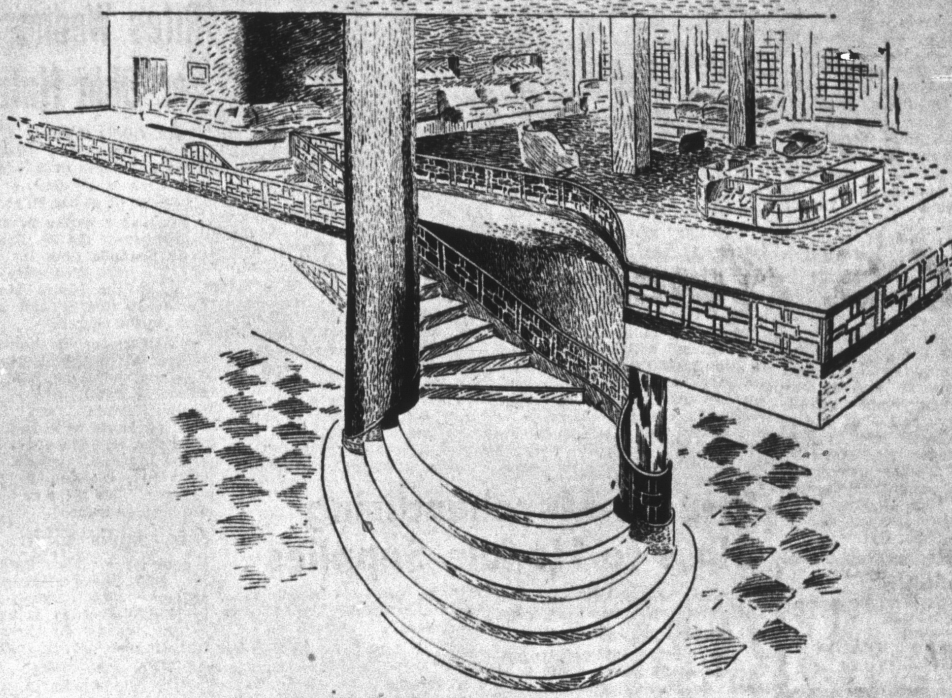
