Cecil K. Calvert Dies Here at 61

**Water Plant Expert
Funeral Wednesday**

Cecil K. Calvert, Indianapolis Water Co. purification superintendent, died early this morning shortly after admittance to the Methodist Hospital. He was 61.

Mr. Calvert, who lived at 117 W. Hampton Dr., was a nationally known authority on water purification. Born in Selma, O., Mr. Calvert came to Indianapolis in 1908 as an official of the Indianapolis Water Co. In 1921 he became superintendent of the city sewage disposal plant, retaining that position until 1934. From 1934 until 1936 he was superintendent of the Indianapolis garbage reduction plant. In 1936 he returned to the Indianapolis Water Co. as superintendent of purification.

He was the past president of the Indiana Section of the American Water Works Association, Central State Sewage Works Association, Indiana Section of the American Chemical Society, the Indianapolis Section of American Bacteriologists and the Scientific Club of Indianapolis.

Member of Board of Directors of the Stream Pollution Control Board of Indiana, the Indianapolis Literary Club, the Landmarks Lodge, F. & A. M., and a lifetime member of the Society of Friends.
