Meat Picket Killed In Plant Scuffle

CIO Blames Police, Company for Death

CHICAGO, Apr. 21 (UPI)—Officials of the striking CIO Packinghouse union charged today that a picket who was killed in a picket line scuffle was the victim of "the greed of the meat trust and the strike-breaking police."

The striker, Sante Cicalo, 38, died late yesterday of a skull fracture and internal injuries after he fell beneath the wheels of a truck which was trying to enter the struck Armour & Co. meat plant here.

A joint labor committee composed of officials of the packinghouse workers and other CIO unions planned to lodge a formal protest with Mayor Martin J. Kennelly.

Climbed on Truck

The committee charged after a strategy meeting that police had told the driver of the truck, Steven Bruns, 36, Versailles, O., to proceed with full speed ahead regardless of who might be in the way.

Mr. Bruns was arrested yesterday, but told police he had not known and was injured until they seized him.

Mr. Cicalo was one of a group of pickets who climbed over Mr. Bruns' truck as it moved slowly past the Armour soap plant gate yesterday. In a scuffle that followed, Mr. Cicalo fell off the truck and under its wheels, police said.

Sam Parkes, district secretary of the Packinghouse union, said he would instruct pickets to lie across the gate roadway so that no vehicles could pass.

The death came on the second day of Armour's back to work movement.

Woman, 70, Blames Drunkenness on Spring

TORONTO, Apr. 21 (UPI)—When police arrested 70-year-old Mrs. Rose Burley on charges of drunkenness, she explained it was all because of spring.

"I was just staggering home from a hard day's work," she told the court. "Spring is here. The weather's fine and I'd like to get out of town for good. Just give me another chance. I've only been out of jail five days in the past four years."

"All right," ruled Magistrate G. Prentice. "Get out and stay out."

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Reports to Army Air Force School

Cpl. George W. Hurst, son of Mr. and Mrs. James Webb, 409 Regent St., has reported to Keesler Field, Miss., to begin training in the airplane and engine mechanics school there.

Cpl. Hurst will receive 28 weeks' training, qualifying him to perform maintenance on all conventional type aircraft flown by the U. S. Air Force.

Truck Window Broken by Pickets

A truck window was broken in the first violence reported along the picket lines of the strike-bound Armour & Co. packing plant here last night.

James C. Denny, a driver for the Central Union Truck Depot, said several pickets jumped on the running board of his truck as he started to drive away from the plant.

He said one of the men broke a window when he refused to stop the truck. No arrests were made.

Burton LaRue, president of the United Packinghouse Workers local union, said the pickets were only attempting to induce the driver to stop and talk with them.

The Armour plant attempted to resume operations Monday with a staff of 30 workers of its normal force of 250.

Lack of Offspring Jap Divorce Grounds

TOKYO, Apr. 21 (UPI)—The commonest type of divorce in Japan is the "kickout" divorce.

In rural communities wives are not formally admitted into their husbands' homes until they start knitting little things.

If a bride fails to become pregnant, the marriage is broken off and she leaves without much fuss.

Because of the prevalence of this type of divorce in agricultural communities, the divorce rate is higher there than in cities.

400 Seized in Rio In Anti-Red Drive

RIO DE JANEIRO, Apr. 21—Four hundred persons have been arrested in a new anti-Communist campaign touched off by the recent explosion of an ammunition dump at the villa militar army base, it was learned today.

Police here have asked São Paulo authorities to arrest Communist leader Luís Carlos Prestes who is accused of contempt of Brazilian president, Gaspar Dutra, and insulting the armed forces.
