

## Palace Sources Expect Baby For Elizabeth in October

LONDON, Apr. 27 (UPI)—Sources close to Buckingham Palace expect Princess Elizabeth to become a mother in October.

They believe that some time soon, probably early in June, Elizabeth's secretary will issue a formal announcement that the Princess will accept no social engagements until further notice.

That would be the first official intimation bearing out reports of the future queen's pregnancy.

No official explanation has been put forth as to why Elizabeth will not go to Australia and New Zealand next year with the rest of the royal family. The fact that she was not going appeared to lend some further credence to reports that she was pregnant.

When King George, Queen Elizabeth and Princess Margaret visit Australia and New Zealand, Elizabeth will sit closer to the throne. By act of Parliament

she was declared of legal age at 18 to permit her to sit as a member of the council.

Then, she scarcely had taken her place as a personage of the realm. Now she is the second most important person in the Royal Family. That despite the fact that she remains heiress presumptive rather than heiress apparent, since theoretically at least the king might one day have a son who would be his heir.

In the four years since she was on the council, Elizabeth has attained the full royal stature. She has taken her place in society, has taken an interest in the public endeavor, and has taken her place

as Britain's foremost young matron.

Elizabeth and Philip were expected to be set up in their London residence, Clarence House, by the time the family sails Jan. 27. They can, if they like, move into Buckingham Palace, Windsor Castle, or any other Royal Palace.
