

Regular GOP Committee Completes Slate

Kaiser Sells Local Mill to Chicago Firm

Plant Here to Run At Full Capacity

Sale of the Kaiser-Fraser Steel Rolling Mill division in Indianapolis to a Chicago electrical combine was announced this morning from Willow Run by Clay E. Bedford, Kaiser-Fraser vice president in charge of manufacturing.

The group buying the Kaiser-Fraser mill here is headed by Victor Nemeroff, president of the Electro Manufacturing Corp., Chicago, electrical contractors and suppliers.

The announcement said the plant would continue to operate with about the same personnel. It employs approximately 400. The property will be transferred July 1 and Kaiser-Fraser will operate it at capacity until that date. E. Orday, general manager, said this morning.

Kaiser-Fraser bought the steel plant from the Chapman Price Co. Oct. 6, 1947.

Mr. Bedford explained at Willow Run that K-F's steel outlook had improved greatly in the last 90 days as a result of the acquisition of the Ironblast Blast Furnace at Provo, Utah, which within two weeks is expected to begin producing 300,000 tons annually.

Mr. Bedford said Kaiser-Fraser would receive for the Indianapolis mill all that had been paid for it.

Sicilian-Born Americans Plan Messina Bridge

ROME, Apr. 29 (UP)—Press reports said today that a group of Sicilian-born Americans would finance construction of a bridge across the Straits of Messina, linking Sicily with the peninsula at the toe of Italy's boot.

The bridge will be started "in the near future," the reports said, and will be high enough to permit the largest commercial ships to pass beneath it.

Rival Faction Hasn't Made Final Decision

May Double Up on Several Candidates

A slate of candidates that will be supported by the regular Republican organization committee at the primary election polls Tuesday was completed today.

This faction, known officially as the Republican Candidates Committee, is composed of party workers aligned with County GOP Chairman James Ingles and Joseph J. Daniels, former 11th District chairman.

They are slating George L. Denny for the Congress nomination, Frank Fairchild for prosecutor, Sheriff Al Magenheimer for renomination, Arthur W. Grayson and George C. Kincaid for the two county commissioner nominations, Dr. Roy B. Storms for Coroner and Paul R. Brown for surveyor. Louis W. Fletcher is unopposed for county treasurer.

No Final Decision

The rival faction organized as the Marion County Republican Campaign committee, formed around associates of James L. Bradford, former county GOP chairman, had not reached final decisions on its slate. However, this group may double up with the other committee on several of the candidates.

One certain double slate candidate will be Sheriff Magenheimer whose candidacy was backed first by the Bradford committee and later "taken" by the other group. The only formidable opposition to the sheriff is Otto W. Gasper who still has some of the regular organization workers behind him but apparently not enough to overcome the double slate power behind the sheriff.

Fights Uphill Contest

In the prosecutor race, the incumbent, Judson L. Stark, appeared to be fighting an uphill contest against Mr. Fairchild, the organization candidate. Up to today, Prosecutor Stark had not appeared on any organization slate.

The Bradford group was still presumed to be backing Hoyt Moore for the Congress nomination against Mr. Denny but no formal slating of Mr. Moore has been authorized.

The regular GOP organization committee is slating temporarily the following candidates for the legislature:

For House of Representatives—Harry E. Bacon, Harry W. Claffey, Dr. Clark Day, Nellie E. Downey, James F. Durnil, Rufus Kuykendall, Joyce Loomis, A. Ross Manly, Frank W. Morton, John G. Tindler and J. Russell Townsend.

Old Jerusalem Heeds UN Truce

Designed to Save Religious Shrines

JERUSALEM, Apr. 29 (UP)—British light artillery and mortars shelled Jews attacking Jerifa today, but Hagana and Irgun Zvai Leumi forces returned the fire and were advancing.

After a nightlong lull, the fighting of the last five days was resumed after dawn. British two-pounders and mortars laid down a heavy fire and Irgunists replied with mortars, machineguns and other automatic weapons.

Royal Air Force Spitfire fighters, five of which late yesterday attacked Irgun positions with rockets, circled over the Jewish positions again today, but did not attack. British authorities said they were for "moral effect."

Both Arabs and Jews received with joy the news of the United Nations agreement for a truce for the old walled city of Jerusalem. It halted a mass evacuation of Arabs from the Holy City.

Arab and Jewish spokesmen agreed yesterday to the truce.

Arab efforts to halt the evacuation had failed, even though consulates of adjacent Arab states had been asking a deposit of \$100 before issuing visas. The money is returnable when the visa holder returns to Palestine.

Jews, meanwhile, laid down a landing strip on the outskirts of Jerusalem under Arab fire and scheduled regular flights to Tel Aviv. The Jewish lifeline supply route by highway has been under heavy Arab pressure.

A report from Beirut said the Lebanese government has imposed press censorship on all Palestine matters, including military movements. Other Arab governments are expected to follow suit.

Combined Jewish forces in Tel Aviv sealed off the Arab port city of Haifa by land and pressed their attack into the fifth day against formidable Arab resistance.

Federation Issues Political Stand

The Church Federation of Indianapolis today issued a statement to eliminate any "possible misunderstanding arising out of the personal endorsement given by its personnel for candidates for public office."

"No authorization has been granted for anyone to speak directly or by inference for the Church Federation in political matters," declared Jerrus M. Bryant, president of the federation.

"Such endorsement should be considered as the personal opinion of the individual which does not necessarily reflect the opinion of the executive committee of the federation."

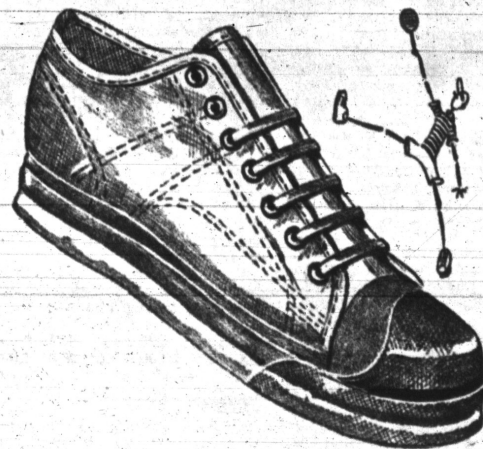

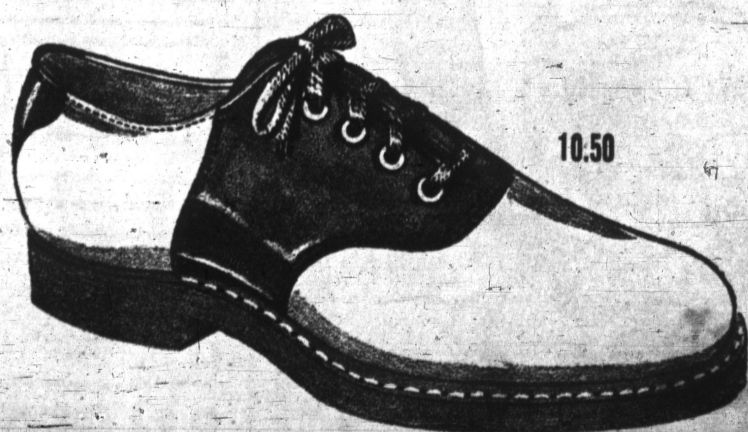
