

Harry Krause, Clothier, Dies Here at 72

Funeral Wednesday;
Burial in Crown Hill

Services for Harry W. Krause, Indianapolis clothier for more than half a century, will be held at 3 p.m. Wednesday in the Flanner and Titus Mortuary and burial will be in Crown Hill. The Rev. Dallas Browning, pastor of the North Meridian Street Methodist Church, and the Rev. Leonard Hunt, superintendent of the Wheeler City Rescue Mission, will officiate.

A lifelong resident of Indianapolis and owner of the Harry W. Krause Co., men's clothing firm at 24 N. Pennsylvania St., Mr. Krause died yesterday in his home at 1 E. 36th St. of a heart attack. He was 72. His only immediate survivor is his wife, Mrs. Lillian Mosiman Krause.

Mr. Krause entered the clothing business in 1896 with his father, Reinhold Krause, in the 700 block of Massachusetts Ave.

Active in Church

He was active in Indianapolis church life. For 62 years he was a member of the First Evangelical Church, New York and East Streets. Recently he transferred his membership to the North Methodist Church at 38th and Meridian Streets.

Mr. Krause was a board member of the Indianapolis Church Federation and past president of the Marion County Sunday School Association. He was a Sunday School superintendent, teacher and president of men's Bible classes and served on many church boards.

For 25 years he was president of the Wheeler City Rescue Mission Board and was recently made president emeritus. The present mission building at 245 N. Delaware St. was built under his leadership.

Mr. Krause also was a past president of the E. Washington Street Merchants' Association, a charter member of the Indianapolis Athletic Club, the Advertising Club of Indianapolis and the Indianapolis Better Business Bureau and a member of the Indianapolis Chamber of Commerce.

His store was always a favorite gathering place for sports fans to listen to radio broadcasts of the World Series and other leading athletic events. He even passed out bags of peanuts for atmosphere during the annual fall baseball classic.
