For the first time voting machines will be used in all precincts of Marion County for primary balloting.

In the municipal year, voting machines in part of the precincts will be used in the remaining parts of the county.

Results of the balloting will be known three hours after close.

Procedure is as follows:

Balloting for non-party primaries is a simple procedure.

Before you enter the polls you must tell the clerk you are voting. He is a Democrat.

An election official will give you a key to the machine to your party.

After entering the machine, pull the key out and place it in the slot on the right.

On the face of the machine are six lines of names.

On the face of the machine are six lines of names across. The top line is the Republican candidate.

Merely pick your man for your party you want for the various offices down the line.

Then, push the lever back to the left. Your vote is cast.
