Military rites for Pfc. John R. Lents, killed in France on Jan. 16, 1945, after being overseas only three months, will be at 9 a. m. Wednesday in St. Anthony's Catholic Church. Burial will be in Holy Cross Cemetery.

The son of Mr. and Mrs. Herman Lents, Pfc. Lents was 21 and lived at 345 N. Addison St. He attended Cathedral and Washington High Schools. Born in Cambridge, he had lived here for 19 years. He enlisted in the combat engineers in March, 1942.

Survivors besides his parents include two sisters, Maxine and Elleen Lents, and five brothers, Donald, George, Lester, Max and Thomas Lents, all of Indianapolis.
