

Arline Judge Halts 6th Wedding Plans

Church Officials Ask Previous Papers

NEW YORK, May 5 (UP)—Actress Arline Judge, who divorced millionaire Bob Topping two weeks ago so that he could marry screen star Lana Turner, broke off plans for her sixth wedding today at almost the last minute.

The \$20,000 trousseau she had bought for this afternoon's scheduled civil wedding to insurance executive George Ross Jr. was left hanging in the dress shop.

Her lawyer announced the wedding plans had been "postponed indefinitely." He gave no reasons.

Records Demanded
Friends of the couple said, however, that the postponement was caused by their desire for a church wedding. Church authorities, they said, were demanding the records on Miss Judge's five previous marriages and all the papers were not immediately available.

The couple had announced elaborate wedding plans on Monday. They were to be married today in the chambers of Supreme Court Justice Ferdinand Pecora. Following that, 300 guests were to attend a reception at the Park Lane Hotel.

The reception had been planned to rival last week's Hollywood wedding of Mr. Topping and Miss Turner.

Miss Judge had purchased a \$20,000 trousseau of 35 gowns and 40 hats and gloves at an exclusive Fifth Avenue dress shop. The bridal dress was styled in "Arline pink."

Recording Shows That Pesky Moth Grinds His Teeth

ITHACA, N. Y., May 5—The sound of a "moth chewing through a fabric" has been preserved on a phonograph record by Cornell University scientists here.

The scientists last year produced an album of 72 bird songs. Their latest is an album of eight sides featuring the calls of 26 varieties of frogs and toads. But the moth record was made on special request—from an advertising agency with a client selling mothballs.

Getting a moth to chew at the right time and place proved to be the greatest difficulty. This was overcome by sewing the larva in a tiny cloth sack. It had to chew its way out.

And what does a moth chewing cloth sound like? "Someone eating corn flakes," reports one of the scientists, Prof. Paul Kellogg.

Burns to Death In Auto Crash

Seek Identity Of U. S. 52 Victim

Investigators today were still attempting to obtain positive identification of a man who was burned to death yesterday in a traffic accident.

He was believed to be Ralph Weaver of Lafayette, whose car skidded on U. S. 52 near Fraders Point and crashed into a truck.

Russell E. Yarber, 21, of Lebanon, the truck driver, and another motorist tried to extricate the injured victim. But the gasoline tank of the victim's car exploded and drove the rescuers back.

The body was burned to the point where identification was impossible. However, a bracelet on one wrist bore the name of the Lafayette man.

Puts Out Blaze
Hundreds of baseball tickets, punch boards, pick-and-win tickets and other gambling paraphernalia were strewn on the highway. State police said they came from the victim's car.

A city fire squad put out the blaze and removed the body. A 17-year-old youth, who had been drinking, fell off his bicycle last night in the 500 block, Fletcher Ave. He required treatment at General Hospital.

William V. Casey, 60, of Bridgeport, was in fair condition today at St. Vincent's Hospital after being injured yesterday when a truck he was driving struck a tree in the 500 block, W. Kesler Blvd., police were told.

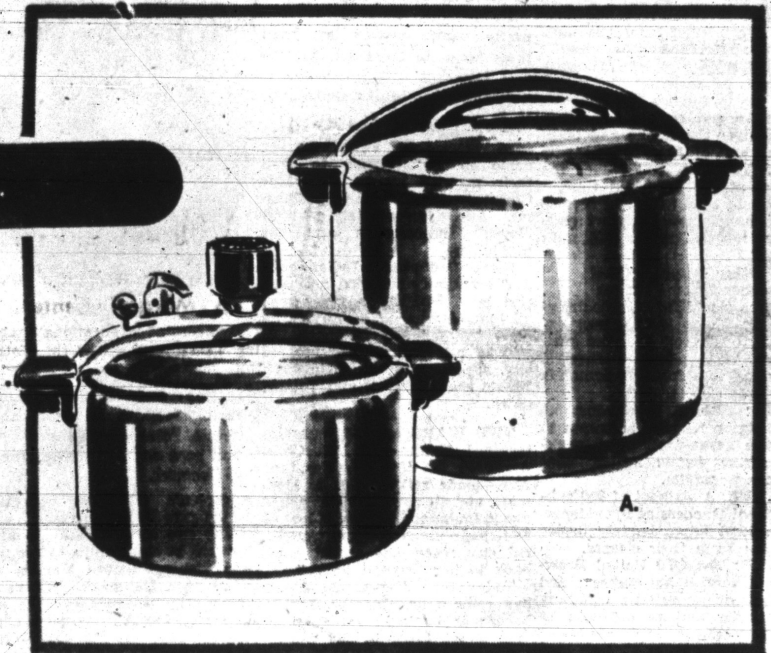
