Outdoor life showed the transition from pioneer living to modern scouting.

As the Grand finale began, the lights were turned out and friction fires started with tinder by the boys glittered in a large circle around the floor of the building.

Carl Parlika, retired scout executive, of Elgin, Ill., gave an Indian prayer in English and Dakota to close the show.

C. Otto Janus is general chairman of the circus which closes tonight.

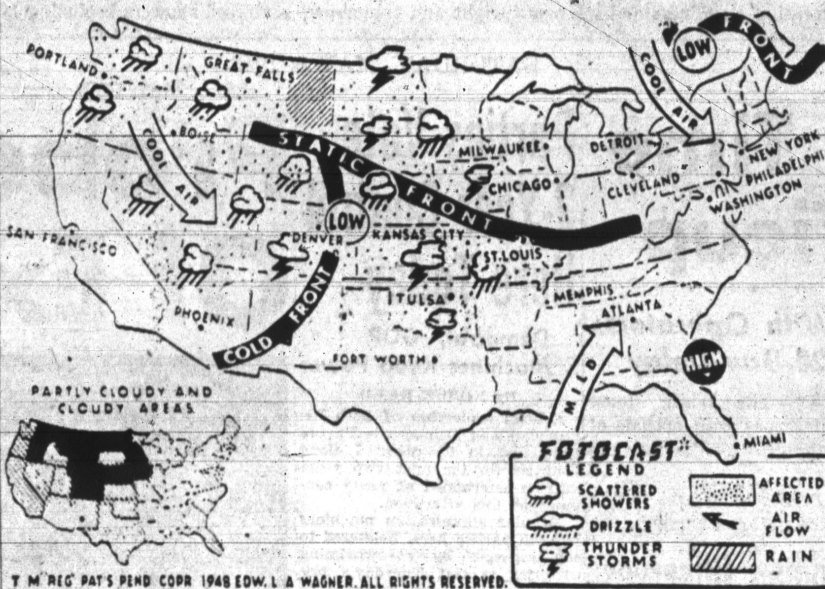

County, the betting odds on a Democratic county administration will rise with it.

If a majority of Marion County voters start leaning toward the GOP presidential nominee and governor candidate that will be the election fate of the whole Republican ticket for county government, congressional and legislative offices.

Records of local balloting as far back as 1912 show that Marion County elections swing with national issues in all Presidential elections.

Many Not on Books
OPENING OF the Marion County voters' registration office Monday on listings for next November's general election is a reminder that more than 100,000 adult residents of the county are not on the balloting books.

Total registration now is 232,500. The estimated adult population (over 21) is about 350,000. One-way downtown streets to relieve traffic congestion will not become a reality this year, partly due to the lack of city funds but also Mayor Feeney's knowledge of human nature.

A change in the law permitted driving through downtown zones for a short time. During this period, Mr. Johnson kept detailed accident records on each zone location.

He found accidents involving pedestrians rose 18 per cent.
