Group Sets Annual Foreign Affairs Meet

17th. Institute Opens Thursday

RICHMOND, May 11.—"The Organization of the World for Peace" will be the theme of the 17th annual Foreign Affairs Institute Thursday, Friday and Saturday here in Goddard Auditorium at Earlham College.

Featured speakers include U. S. Senator Homer E. Capenhardt (R. Ind.), Dr. Kenneth P. Landon, State Department's Far Eastern affairs expert; Nelson Johnson, U. S. ambassador to China and Australia, and Bonner Fellers, assistant to the chairman of the Republican National Committee.

At Thursday night's opening session Dr. Thomas E. Jones, Earlham president, will preside and give an address of welcome to guests from all sections of Indiana and Ohio. Mr. Fellers and Dr. Landon will discuss "Universal Military Training" and "Factors in the Formulation of Foreign Policy Toward Southeastern Asia." Mr. Fellers, a retired Army general who served as secretary general of the Allied Council for Japan, is a former Earlham student, while Mr. Landon is a former faculty member.

Speak on Friday

Sen. Capenhardt and Mr. Johnson, who is a member of the American mission to China, will speak before the Friday evening and Saturday morning sessions.

Two Earlham professors will speak at the closing session Saturday night. J. Arthur Funston's subject will be "American and Russian Relations in Perspective" and the topic of Joachim Jaenickie, history professor, will be "Is Europe Worth Saving?" Prof. Jaenickie, a native German who fled to this country in 1939, plans to return to Germany this summer with his American wife and two children to help rehabilitate his homeland.

Dr. W. C. Dennis, Earlham president emeritus and professor of international law, is director of the Foreign Affairs Institute.


