

# Jam in Senate May Hold Back Anti-Red Bill

## Taft Voices Doubt Of Vote This Year

WASHINGTON, May 20 (UP)—Sen. Robert A. Taft (R. O.) doubted today that the Senate will act this year on the House-approved bill to slap stiff curbs on Communists in this country.

Mr. Taft, who is chairman of the Senate Republican Policy Committee, said he is not satisfied with some provisions of the bill and that it probably will need a "lot" of study by the Judiciary Committee.

### Log-Jam of Bills

The Senate is faced with a log-jam of higher priority bills and Mr. Taft held out little hope that it could find time to take up the Communist-control measure before adjournment, now tentatively set for late June.

However, acting Senate Republican Leader Kenneth S. Wherry of Nebraska, said the overwhelming 319 to 59 vote by which the House passed the bill yesterday "makes it mandatory we act on that bill or something like it before adjournment."

If the Senate fails to act before the session ends, the bill will be dead and have to be introduced all over again next year.

### Held Mandatory

Rep. Richard M. Nixon (R. Cal.), one of the authors of the House bill, agreed with Mr. Wherry that the Senate had an obligation to give it the right of way.

The bill would require the Communist Party and its front organizations to register annually with the Justice Department. And Communist leaders would face stiff fines and jail terms if they failed to break alleged ties with Moscow.

It also would bar all Communists from federal jobs, deny them passports and require them to put the Communist label on all mail they send out.

There was no indication if or when the Senate Judiciary Committee would take it up.

## Ludlow and Madden Vote With Opposition

WASHINGTON, May 20—Indiana's two Democrats—Reps. Louis Ludlow, Indianapolis, and Ray Madden, Gary—were among the 58 who voted against the Mundt Communist-control bill when it passed the House with 319 "yea" votes.

The 9 Hoosier Republicans all voted for it and Majority Leader Halleck (R. Ind.) spearheaded the debate for the bill against Rep. Vito Marcantonio (A. L. N. Y.). Both are lawyers and their conflict largely was confined to legal points.

## Hotel Clerk, Slugged, Stops Fleeing Bandit With Bullets

### Man Found Wounded in Liquor Store Identified Later as Robber, Assailant

Pretending to be unconscious after a bandit slugged him, John P. Scott, 77, Jefferson Hotel night clerk, grabbed a gun out of a desk drawer and fired five times at the robber as he went out the hotel door last night.

Before Mr. Scott reported the incident to police, officers received a report that a man with a bullet wound in his leg was lying on the floor of a liquor store, 226 Indiana Ave., a block away from the hotel.

Identified as Bandit

Mr. Scott identified the wounded man as the bandit who a few minutes earlier asked for a room and when told there was none, asked for cigarettes.

"When I turned to get the cigarettes, I was slugged on the back of the head," Mr. Scott said. "I lay still on the floor and after he took money out of the cash drawer and started toward the door, I got the gun and fired five times."

Asked for Police

The bandit ran down the stairway of the hotel at 66 W. New York St., and bumped into a guest, Paul Williams, 21, knocking him down the steps.

### Affects Arlington, Millersville Lines

The Millersville motor coach and Arlington feeder bus line extensions have been approved by the Public Service Commission of Indiana. They will become effective Sunday morning.

Half of the buses on the Millersville line will run east at 38th St. and Orchard Ave. on 38th St. to Rural St., south on Rural St. to 37th St., west on 37th St. to Temple Ave., north on Temple Ave. to 38th St., west on 38th St. to Keystone Ave., and south on the regular Millersville route. The other half of the buses will continue over the present route.

The Arlington feeder bus line will be extended from its southern terminus at 10th St. and Arlington Ave. west on 10th St. to Ritter Ave., south on Ritter Ave. to the Brookville Rd., northwest on the Brookville Rd. to Emerson Ave., north on Emerson Ave. to 10th St., east on 10th St. to Arlington Ave. and north over the present route.

## 'X-Ray Telescope' Devised For Diagnosis by Television

### Westinghouse Scientists Hail Invention; Only Pilot Tube Thus Far Has Been Built

NEW YORK, May 20—Let's suppose you are a patient in a hospital here. You have a serious heart ailment. Your physician wants the advice of a specialist located in a city perhaps hundreds of miles away.

He wants the specialist to observe the movements of your heart, so that a better diagnosis can be made. Can such a long-range diagnosis be done? Not now, but perhaps within a year, according to scientists of the Westinghouse Electric Co.

The achievement may be made, they disclosed, through use of a newly developed "X-ray telescope" that is designed to make images of patients' internal organs in living action 500 times brighter.

The new machine, they added, will make the images of the pumping heart and other internal organs so bright that they can be picked up by television.

At the rate television relays are being set up, most large cities will be hooked together within a few years. Operations already have been televised at hospitals.

CHICAGO, May 20—Cartoonist Al Capp gave readers of the "Y" all a comic strip something new when he produced the talking chippendale chair.

## Homeland Same as Russia, Say Czechs

LONDON, May 20 (UP)—

Eight refugees who fled from Czechoslovakia in a stolen plane said today that they came to England because their homeland now was "the same as Russia."

They landed at Manston Airfield, Kent, Tuesday night, completing the first Czechoslovakian escape by air. Other Czechoslovakians had escaped in similar fashion to other places on the continent.

Five of the refugees explained that they had been fired from the Czechoslovakian air force for marrying English girls. They said their wives left Prague some time ago and were not yet aware of their presence in England. The other three are young bachelors.
