



Butler's Tyke Shoots At Broad Jump Mark



TAKEOFF—Howard (Tyke) Manifold, Butler University's hope for a new broad jump record in the Big State track and field meet Saturday at Bloomington, hits the board for one of his prodigious leaps. Manifold, who claims to have fouled only twice during the past track season, takes off after a sprint of 74 feet, 4 inches.

THE KICK—In the air, it's not a bird, it's not a plane, it's not even superman. Its Manifold again caught in the finish of the scissors kick which adds impetus, and also distance to his jump. Seeking his first Big State crown, Tyke is the holder of the Little State diadem, leaping 24 feet, 1 1/8 inches for a new mark last week.

THE GLIDE—From this position it is just a breeze for the jumper, shown in a kind of flying, sitting jack knife. Manifold, a product of Mooreland (Ind.) High School, now possesses two letters in track from Butler and one letter in baseball. While in high school he was able to jump only a little better than 17 feet.

HAPPY LANDING—The dirt flies, and with a grunt Manifold throws himself forward to successfully complete another leap. Tyke who originally came to Butler to play basketball became a broad jumper because it is not quite as great a strain as the cage sport. He played baseball until he realized the talent he had for leaping.

Bagby Shoots for 8th Win in Toledo Finale

Indians Return Home Tomorrow; Bahr Holds Hens While Mates Beat a Southpaw

TOLEDO, May 20—Having come out of a three-game slump by trimming the wings of the Mud Hens here last night, the Indians' Tribesters feel cheerful and confident that they would repeat tonight in the finale of the abbreviated series.

Big Jim Bagby is due to operate on the Indians' mound, and since he's the Redskin's ace, there is every reason to believe that the Hoosier pastimes will depart here with two straight started in their bat bag.

Bagby will be gunning for his eighth win in nine starts. He has achieved his seventh victory in Louisville last Saturday.

The Indians took good care of the left-handed business last night by thumping Chet Johnson, Toledo southpaw, 4 to 2. They batted him out in the fourth stanza.

Turner Comes Through

Catcher Earl Turner, who swings righthanded, had the coveted distinction of batting in two runs in the fourth, the winning runs. He did it with a single with the bases loaded.

But Roy Weatherly, who swings left-handed, put the whammy on Lefty Johnson in the second inning by belting a homer over the right-field wall. Prior to that, in the first inning, Tom Saffell, who swings left, doubled and tallied on Don Gutteridge's single.

Ed Bahr worked the route for the Indians to bring his record to three and three. He did not issue a single base on balls and struck out five.

Double Plays Help

Two Tribe double plays, one started by Bahr, killed off a couple of Toledo rally threats. The Indians now have compiled 52 twin killings.

Emory Rudd, righthander who relieved Johnson on the Mud Hen rubber in the fourth, pitched great relief ball, but it was too late. He only allowed four hits in the last five and two-thirds innings.

The Indians will return home after tonight's game to begin a long stand at Victory Field, starting off with the Minneapolis Millers.
