'Madam President' Indianapolis Council of Women

MRS. B. LYNN ADAMS is a clubwoman who believes in getting things done with speed. Installed just this month as president of the Indianapolis Council of Women, she isn't waiting for opening of the club season next fall to "get going."

Today she inaugurated an orientation meeting for presidents and delegates of clubs affiliated with the council. Held this afternoon in the Central Library Auditorium, this first orientation "class" was designed to explain, well in advance of next season's programs, the council's work. The round-table discussion of activities, for which Mrs. Emil C. Iverson served as program chairman, found each of the council directors and officers describing her work.

THE FACT THE COURSE was held so soon after her installation as council head in itself, a tribute to Mrs. Adams' ability to get things done under handicaps. While the planning was under way, Mrs. Adams also was coping with homemaking problems. Interior decorators had descended upon the Adams house at 406 E. 51st St. (They're still there.)

Along with her council activities, Mrs. Adams handles a full-time job as homemaker—and even finds time to share the family's enthusiasm for bridge.
