Charge Former Inmate With Slaying of Three

MARSHALL, Mo., May 24 (UPI) — A former inmate of the Missouri state school for the feeble-minded will be returned here today to face charges that he killed a deputy sheriff and two other persons.

Authorities said Norman Blodgett, 22, Kansas City, ran amok at the institution yesterday when attendants tried to prevent him from seeing a girl inmate.

He was wounded in an ensuing gun battle but escaped to Kansas City. He was captured there several hours later.
