

7 Sentenced In Hot Car Swindle Case

Leader Gets 13 Years, \$10,000 Fine

Seven members of a \$36,000 "hot car" ring today were under Federal prison sentences.

Leader of the ring, Oliver W. (Jack) Manifold, 42, of 4035 Ruckle St., received a 13-year sentence and a fine of \$10,000 from Judge Robert C. Baltzell.

A local gambling figure, he told the judge "he was the only work I could get with my record." He served seven years in Ohio State Penitentiary for armed robbery.

Raymond F. (Pete) Ivory, 39-year-old front man for the ring and a government witness, drew a 10½-year sentence and a \$2000 fine.

Placed on Probation

Others sentenced were L. Marvin (Buz) Gardner, 39, of 1810 N. Alabama St., seven years, \$2500 fine; Richard M. Shelton, 34, of 2821 Park Ave., five years, \$500; Carl McWilliams, 38, of 31 N. Sheffield Ave., two years, \$500; Karl VonWiller, 45, of 2017 N. Pennsylvania St., two years, \$1500, and John H. Lewis, 44, of 1740 E. 72d St., Ravenswood, two years, \$500.

Another defendant, Lawrence N. (Pinky) Smith, 34, of 333 Moreland Ave., was sentenced to two years and fined \$500, but placed on five years' probation.

The ring bought used cars with bogus cashier's checks at auctions and resold the cars, evidence showed.

The men were charged with violations of the National Motor Vehicle and National Stolen Property Acts.

He said he took the car "just to run around for a while" and then he abandoned them.

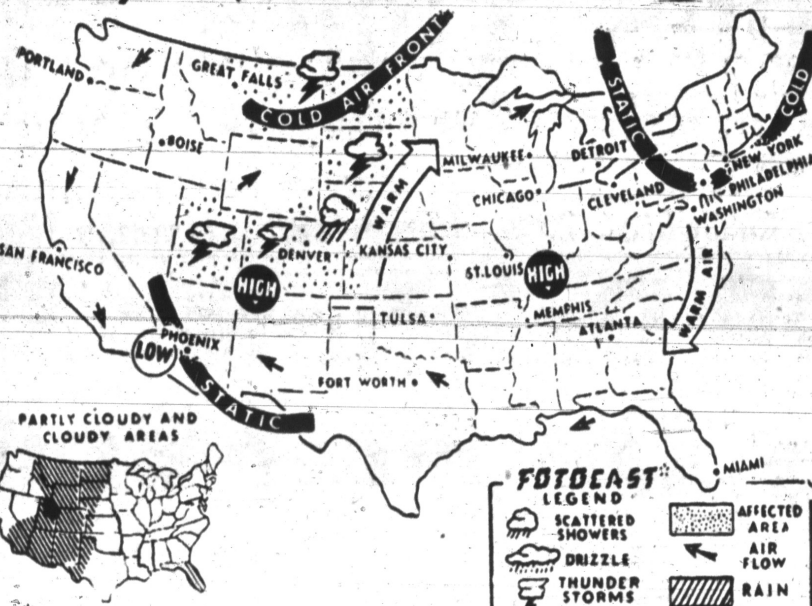
He was turned over to Juvenile Court authorities.

Judge Baltzell, of the district court of the United States for the southern district of Indiana, will meet with the board next Saturday at the regular June meeting.

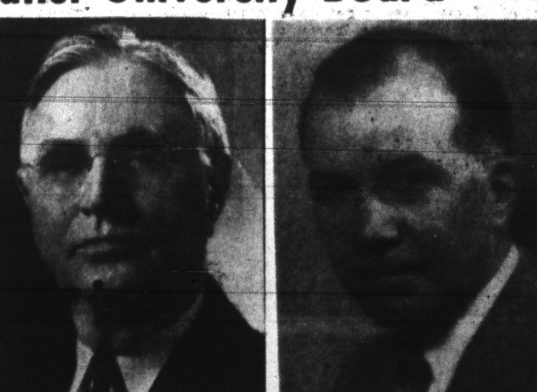
Filled Judgeship

Group to Tour Historical Indiana Spots

Speakers to Give Account of Events

LAFAYETTE, June 1 — The second Hoosier Historical Institute will be held Saturday and Sunday as enrollees tour spots of historical interest on the Ohio River in southern Indiana.

Teacher extension groups from Clinton, Seymour, Brownstown and Tipton will join regular enrollees. Prof. Ross F. Lockridge and guest speakers will give on-the-spot accounts of significant historical events.

The opening session at 10 a. m. Saturday will convene on the site of Lochry's Massacre, where Laughey Creek joins the Ohio River near Aurora. The colorful details of the Indian battle, which prevented George Rogers Clark from going to Detroit will be recounted.

The second session at 1:30 p. m. will be on the lawn of the Lanier Home in Madison. Clarence Dryden, president of the Jefferson County Historical Society, will be in charge of the session. Judge Harry Nichols and President George Albert Parker, of Hanover College, will discuss historical facts.

To Recall Massacre

The groups will then proceed to the site of Pigeon Roost Massacre on U. S. Highway 31, six miles south of Scottsburg, where at 4 p. m. the program will cover the events of the massacre of the pioneer community during the War of 1812. Descendants of the pioneers will show guests family and historical relics.

A campfire at 7:30 p. m. on the site of the George Rogers Clark home overlooking the falls of the Ohio will climax the day's events. The group will gather about the campfire for songs and stories, and Colonel Lucien Backner, Kentucky historian, will be guest speaker.

Corydon, the location of the old state capitol and the Constitutional Elm, will be the scene of the meeting at 1:30 p. m. Sunday. "Kentucky Belle" will be recited on the site of Morgan's Raid. Patriotic songs of the Civil War period and the Shepherds' Song, "Corydon" for which the town was named will be part of the afternoon's entertainment.

Frank Gilkison, of the Indiana Supreme Court, will be guest speaker for the afternoon session.

Hitler's Doctor, 6 Others Hanged

Medical 'Butchers' Pay for Crimes

FRANKFURT, June 2 (UPI)—Karl Brandt, Hitler's personal physician, and six other Nazi doctors were hanged at Landsberg prison today for war crimes.

Convicted at Nuernberg last August after an eight-month trial, they appealed without success to the U. S. Military Government for clemency and petitioned the U. S. Supreme Court for a review of their case.

Gen. Lucius D. Clay, American occupation commander, upheld the U. S. tribunal that sentenced them and the supreme court refused jurisdiction.

Dealt Out Death

In addition to Brandt, those executed were Wolfram Sievers, director of a research institute which collected Jewish skeletons for "research";

Karl Gebhardt, Himmler's personal physician; Rudolph Brandt, no relation to Karl, a personal administrative assistant to Himmler; Joachim Murgowsky, chief of the SS Hygienic Institute

Viktor Brack, a colonel in the medical corps; and Waldemar Hoven, chief physician in the notorious Buchenwald concentration camp.

Evidence introduced at their trial convicted them of inhuman and death dealing experiments on inmates of Nazi concentration camps.

They conducted research in typhoid and typhus fevers, malaria, bone transplantation, resistance freezing temperatures and similar tests in the name of the Nazi armed forces.

Crisis Appeared To Be Waning

PORTLAND, Ore., June 2 (UPI)—The Columbia River and the flood crisis were falling slowly at Portland and the flood crisis was waning after two record-breaking days of rain.

Approximately 100,000 were homeless, 28 per cent killed or drowned and estimated at \$100 million in property damage. The Columbia River is a 300-foot wide waterway, carrying a load from the Columbia area 100 miles to the mouth of the river.
