Clark to Tour Flooded Oregon

PORTLAND, Ore., June 8 (UP)—Sixth Army Commander Gen. Mark Clark flies to Portland today for a personal air and water tour of the flooded Columbia River Basin.

President Truman will inspect the area Friday.

Meantime, Army and Navy men dug in with volunteer civilians for a drag-out battle to hold dikes along a 360-mile front.

Weather Forecaster Elmer Fisher predicted the flood would hold near its crest for several weeks.

The second flood crest of the Columbia dropped slightly today but a third crest is expected to hit late this week.

The Red Cross announced a list of 715 persons and families that it had been unable to trace in the Vanport city disaster.

200 State Farmers To Take Jaunt West

Some 200 Indiana farmers will take a 5000-mile trip to the West between harvest seasons this summer, the Indiana Farm Bureau said today.

The vacation journey will start Aug. 19 and will include visits to Pike's Peak and four national parks, the bureau said.

Trip manager Glenn Sample said the trip was timed so that it would allow farmers to leave after the small grain harvest of wheat and oats and to return to the state in time for the corn harvest and the state fair.

Mr. Sample said reservations would be limited to 200 persons because of space limitations of park housing facilities. A similar trip was made last year.

'Know Your Neighbor,' Convention Told

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., June 8 (UP)—Americans must awake to the danger of "sinister forces which would enslave us in fantastic dreams from abroad," Karl Rex Hammers, Pittsburgh, national head of the Shriners, warned today.

"What we need today is alertness—know your neighbor and what he is and stands for," the Imperial Potentate told the opening meeting of the 47th annual Imperial Council session of the Shriners here.

"We must be ever alert to the inroads of a vicious propaganda against Americanism," he said.

"Under our Constitution a man is entitled to his beliefs, be they what they may, but if he believes in certain ideas and ideals he should have the courage to come out in the open and let us all know where he stands."

40,000 in Mardi Gras

Pleading for continuation of the free enterprise system, Mr. Hammers said, "we do not need big business, big government or big labor to subsidize the truly American incentive of free competition and ability."

More than 40,000 Shriners from all sections of the country took part in a huge Mardi Gras on the boardwalk last night to open the five-day convulse. Many of the delegates will reside in special Pullmans in 27 special trains which brought them to the seashore resort yesterday.

Representatives of nearly 40 temples paraded for five hours this morning. A torch light parade will be held Wednesday night.

Council Asked to OK Transfer of \$8000 From Engineer's Office for New Sewers

The City today has taken another step in its program to construct nine sewer projects within the next year.

An ordinance was introduced at City Council last night calling for the transfer of \$8000 in the engineer's department to be used to employ three engineers and a draftsman for special work on the sewer plans.

Under the appropriation ordinance the salaries would be available July 1. M. G. Johnson, city engineer, set up the salary schedule to provide \$2400 for a sewer engineer supervisor, \$2100 for a sewer design engineer, \$1950 for a structural design engineer and \$1200 for a draftsman.

\$500 for Printing

The ordinance appropriates \$500 to be used for printing and advertising needed in the sewer program. The ordinance will come up for a deciding vote at the next council meeting June 21.

A plan to revamp the police and fire pension system by placing it under the administration of the state public employee's retirement fund was presented to the council last night by Ross Teckemeyer, fund director.

He contended the plan would save city taxpayers \$100,000 a year by 1954. His plan would also increase contributions by firemen and policemen to \$60 a year compared with the present rate of \$81 for firemen and \$60 for policemen.

In other actions last night the council:

Passed an ordinance requiring a \$25 city license fee from all coal yards. The present ordinance requires a license only from each dealer. Dealers can operate as many yards as they desire on one license.

Voted a new set of regulations governing dumping which permits the disposal of combustibles on public and private dumps.

'Quickie' Decree Upheld

WASHINGTON, June 8 (UP)—The Supreme Court today upheld the "quickie" divorce law in a decision that foretold the divorce law is almost certain to be upheld in all other states.

That will be true, the court said, where the divorce is granted by a state that has a "quickie" divorce law.
