Clark to Tour Flooded Oregon

PORLTAND, Ore., June 8 (UPI)—Sixth Army Commander Gen. Mark Clark flies to Portland today for a personal air and water tour of the flooded Columbia River Basin.

President Truman will inspect the area Friday.

Meantime, Army and Navy men dug in with volunteer civilians for a drag-out battle to hold dikes along a 360-mile front. Weather Forecaster Elmer Fisher predicted the flood would hold near its crest for several weeks.

The second flood crest of the Columbia dropped slightly today, but a third crest is expected to hit late this week.

200 State Farmers To Take Jaunt West

Some 200 Indiana farmers will take a 5000-mile trip to the West between harvest seasons this summer, the Indiana Farm Bureau said today.

The vacation journey will start Aug. 19 and will include visits to Pike's Peak and four national parks, the bureau said.

Trip manager Glenn Sample said the trip was timed so that it would allow farmers to leave after the small grain harvest of wheat and oats and to return to the state in time for the corn harvest and the state fair.

Mr. Sample said reservations would be limited to 200 persons because of space limitations of park housing facilities. A similar trip was made last year.
