Man Slices Off Nose In Another Crash

A 16-year-old girl was hurled 25 feet into a ditch by an automobile and a man on a bicycle crashed through the window of a parked car and cut the end of his nose off in traffic mishaps last night.

Miss Norma Celea, 16, of 1422 Fruitdale Ave., was walking in the 5800 block, W. Washington St., when she was struck by a car driven by Sam Swinford, 415 E. Michigan St.

Cost of Living At All-Time High

Indications Point To Continued Rise

WASHINGTON, June 23 (UP)—The cost of living hit a new all-time high last May 15, the Labor Department reported today.

In its regular monthly summary of the retail price situation, the department said consumer prices jumped 0.7 per cent between mid-April and mid-May. Although the department has no accurate figures on retail prices since May 15, indications are that living costs have continued to rise.

Up 72.9 Per Cent

On May 15, the department said, retail prices were 72.9 per cent higher than the 1939 average and nearly 30 per cent above June, 1946, when most price controls were abandoned.

According to the department, retail food prices went up 1.4 per cent between mid-April and mid-May; clothing increased 0.6 per cent; rents rose 0.3 per cent higher and fuel prices rose 0.8 per cent. Only house furnishings decreased in price. They averaged 0.6 per cent lower on May 15 than a month earlier.

New Civil Strife Threatens Israel

Shertok Sees Serious Internal Crisis

TEL AVIV, June 23 (UP)—Foreign Minister Moshe Shertok said today that civil strife touched off by Irgun Zvai Leumi dissidents had plunged the fledgling state of Israel into an "internal crisis, the seriousness of which cannot be minimized."

The government bent every effort to stave off the threat of civil war. It decided to demand that the Irgunists surrender their arms unconditionally.

Clamps on Curfew

The army of Israel clamped a curfew on Tel Aviv. The chief of army operations announced that fighting still was going on up to last midnight in various parts of the city. It was particularly heavy in the waterfront area, from which civilians had been evacuated.

Irgunists and fellow Jews fought a battle on the Tel Aviv beach yesterday when a 4600-ton gun-running ship was rammed aground and sought to land Irgunist troops and arms against stiff army opposition. The government has given no accounting of casualties.

Local Police Killer Builds Television Set in Prison

Financed by Institution Official, Device Believed First Installed Behind Walls

MICHIGAN CITY, June 23 (UP)—Will Mason, 49, an Indiana state prison inmate with a yen for tinkering with radios, today assured his fellow prisoners that they would enjoy television before many free people outside the walls.

Mason, a life-terminer convicted 14 years ago of the holding slaying of an Indianapolis policeman, built an expensive television set from a factory kit.

Prison officials said the set passed its test showing and soon will parade a variety of programs on a large 8-by-10-foot screen before 1200 convicts.

Warden Ralph Howard believed it was the first set to be installed in any prison in the country. He said Mason had proven so handy around the prison that he was appointed maintenance man for the prison's radio and 100-line telephone systems.

A year ago, Mason learned that television signals from Chicago could be picked up at the prison. He dug through masses of material on television and came up with the set.

He was financed in his project by prison board chairman, Carter H. Manny, at a cost of \$650.

Officials and newspapermen who viewed the test said the images on the screen were sharper and better than most home sets.



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


