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Call British Troops In Dock Strike

Guards Ordered To Move Foodstuffs

LONDON, June 23 (UP)—The government called out the Coldstream Guards today to move foodstuffs rotting on the strike-bound London waterfront.

The order to the troops to get the food moving was issued after all but a handful of the 20,000 strikers ignored appeals by the government and union leaders to get back to work.

Five or more of the nearly 150 ships tied up at the strike were loaded with foodstuffs.

Some 4 million eggs were on the Toohey St. wharf. About 350 tons of tomatoes were rotting at the West India dock. Quantities of potatoes were stacked all along the waterfront.

The strike began nine days ago. It was called in protest against the disciplining of 11 dock workers who demanded extra pay for unloading zinc oxide.

Ernest H. Cartwright, secretary of the Alcan Express Co. here, said the company filed the first application on record for transporting goods over the route with the Interstate Commerce Commission yesterday.

Mr. Cartwright said the group thought of the idea because "nobody else had ever done it before." He said the concern planned to haul new cars, trucks, tractors and other mechanized vehicles to Alaska.
