### Cooking in Backyard

Even though you have no outdoor grill built in your backyard, the whole family can have a lot of fun this spring and summer days experimenting with camp-type cooking.

One of the first things to do is to build yourself a cook-hold—a small pit at least half a foot deep—and line it with rocks. When a fire is built in this hole a couple of hours before the cooking is to be done, the rocks will help maintain a fairly even temperature.

One can use a covered pot that fits right into the hole for cooking vegetables or meat. The pot should be surrounded and covered with coals from a good hardwood fire.

Children will have lots of fun baking their own potatoes in sand-filled tin cans. The potato should be wrapped in wet leaves or a wet piece of paper and put in the can so that it is entirely surrounded by sand. Any part that touches the can is likely to burn. Press the lid back over the can and bury it in the hot coals for from 30 to 40 minutes.

These are just a few ideas. Your family probably can work out many others. And from time to time, I'll suggest other backyard eat treats.
