

Earlham College Raises \$1 Million

Rising Costs Cited in Building Program

RICHMOND, July 2—President Thomas E. Jones announced today that alumni and friends of Earlham College have raised \$1 million for the second century development of the Quaker college here.

Isaac E. Woodard of Indianapolis, a trustee of Earlham, is national chairman of the second century committee. Indianapolis persons interested in Earlham raised \$182,612 under the leadership of Elmer W. Stout.

Since the \$1 million building program goal was decided three years ago, costs have risen 50 per cent, Dr. Jones pointed out. For this reason, he announced, an additional \$500,000 will be sought as a "cap sheet" to offset the additional expense.

The Earlham drive is the only successful one for \$1 million in the knowledge of authorities in which no subscription as large as \$50,000 was received. The largest, a \$40,000 gift, came from the late Orville Wright, honorary chairman of the second century committee.

Four building projects on the Quaker campus are to be financed by the fund. The first, a \$150,000 heating plant, has been erected.

9 Arrested in 4 Gambling Raids

Crackdown on Joints Renewed by Police

In a renewal of the two-month-old "crackdown" on gambling, police vice squads arrested nine more men in four raids yesterday and last night.

Will Rogers, 26, of 47 E. LeGrande Ave. and Ed May, 42, of 315 Bicking St., were held on lottery charges last night in a raid on a tavern at 951 S. Delaware St.

In a raid on a poolroom at 2114 Roosevelt Ave., police arrested Andrew Maple, 42, of 2419 Langley Ave., on a charge of operating a lottery.

Seize Racing Sheets
Sam Tyner, 2444 Pierson St., Abe Simpson, 5819 N. Delaware St., and Harry Silverman, 938 S. Meridian St., were held on gambling charges following a raid on an upstairs room at 21½ Kentucky Ave. Several horses race betting sheets were confiscated.

Three men were arrested on gaming charges in a raid on an open-air dice game at 15th St. and Columbia Ave. They were James Goodall, 21, of 1519 N. Arsenal Ave., Harry Steele, 22, of 1338 Columbia Ave., and Robert Seigler, 22, of 1807 Barrow Ave.

Feeney Charges Area Rent Board Is Out of Balance

Too Many Landlord Members, Mayor Says; Control Director Promises Adjustment

Charges that the new area rent board is "out of balance" were made today by Mayor Al Feeney.

He recently nominated two tenant and five public interest members who were then appointed by the federal housing expediter. But he pointed out today that too many landlord members still remain.

Albert J. Lynch, area rent control director, agreed that the board is "off balance" and said anticipated resignations of two landlord members had not developed. He added that the balance must be changed to conform with the new rent control law.

He said if the two landlord members did not resign he would ask the Mayor to nominate additional tenant members to the board to equalize the representation.

Protest in January
Last January Mayor Feeney protested to Washington when the old eight-man board recommended a 25 per cent "across the board" rent increase for Indianapolis. National rent officials refused to approve the increase.

The new 15-member board includes eight public interest members, five landlord members and two tenant members. Included in these are the two tenant and five public interest members recently nominated by the Mayor.

Bans Bardin's Trip To Prison by Plane

Special Treatment for Ex-Brewer Rejected

U. S. Marshal Julius J. Wischase can understand how a man might want to vary the experience of going to prison by plane.

But, he also holds to the belief that prisoners are prisoners and all should be treated alike.

For this reason, Indianapolis businessman Lawrence P. Bardin will not fly to the Federal Reformatory at Ashland, Ky., when he begins a sentence there next week for short-weighting beer. He is a former general manager of the Indianapolis Brewing Co., Inc.

Has Long Record
Marshal Wischase politely listened to Bardin's enthusiasm for flying and his offer to pay his own way to prison. Then, he looked at his criminal record covering 28 years and walked away.

Bardin has been arrested for transporting liquor, automobile theft, forgery, concealing mortgaged property, as a counterfeiting suspect, obtaining property under false pretenses, and obtaining merchandise by confidence game. He has served terms in both Minnesota and Wisconsin state penitentiaries.

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
