

Red Sox Furnish Fireworks For 4th

Ken Eaton Injured in Midget Crash

Four Cars Pile Up; Haddad Wins Feature

A holiday crowd of 9000 witnessed a spectacular four-car crash at the W. 16th St. Midget Speedway last night and saw Eddy Haddad speed to victory in the 30-lap feature.

The pileup, which sent two cars flying through the air, caused no serious injuries although Ken Eaton of New Castle suffered a cracked rib and bruised wrist.

The wreck occurred on the second lap of the fourth heat. Sarge Overmyer, riding the East turn high and too fast, fish-tailed hitting Eaton twice. Eaton in turn was smashed by Aaron Woodard and Charley Skendry as Mel Hansen, driving for Manuel Auyilo in this particular race, climbed over the rear end of Woodard's car.

Flying Midgets

Hansen's mount went flying and landed on its tail, bashing in the rear end. Woodard, whose left arm revealed tire marks from Hansen's car, also went soaring. He said he saw race cars above and below him.

Haddad, who had qualified with the fastest time for the evening, 16 seconds flat, sat on the pole for the feature and was never headed although Johnny Parsons, who moved up to second from back in the field, threatened several times. Patsy Goacher finished third and Hansen, driving for Kenny Eaton, won the fourth spot. Hansen's regular car, owned by Rex Mays, was ruled off the track by AAA officials for throwing oil after the first heat.

Elimination heat winners were Goacher, Jimmy Luddington, Haddad and Ernie Gessell. Goacher won the trophy dash and Bill Baker, a new West Coast pilot, captured the 20-lap semi-final.

Meanwhile at Winchester yesterday, Leroy Warner of Indianapolis set a new record in winning 100-lap midget feature in 38:02.9. Wally Hostettler of Indianapolis was second, Frank Roessler, also of Indianapolis, overturned on the final lap but his condition was reported not serious at Randolph County Hospital.

In big car racing at Bloomington yesterday, Red Bales of Cleveland won the 10-mile feature with Cliff Griffith of Indianapolis second.

Break 3 Records, Tie 1 To Beat Athletics, 19-5

NEW YORK, July 5—Maybe it won't count since the Fourth comes on the fifth this year, but those league leading Boston Braves and Cleveland Indians couldn't be too proud today of the way they were setting the pace on the traditional Independence Day half-way mark.

The Braves, still in front in the National by 2 1/2 games, dropped a double-header to the Phillies, 7 to 2 and 5 to 2, while the Indians stayed one game in front in the American simply by getting themselves rained out of a double-header with the Browns at St. Louis.

Meanwhile, the Red Sox furnished most of the fireworks by going to great lengths to get even with the Athletics, who had beaten them five straight times at Boston this year. Bursting out with a 14-run seventh inning in which they broke three records and tied another, the Red Sox defeated the A's, 19 to 5, and made new converts among fans who think that they will have plenty to say about that pennant come October.

The big inning tied the major league mark set by the Yankees in 1920 and equaled by the Cubs of 1922. Ted Williams set a mark by becoming the first American League player to bat three times in an inning, walking twice and ground out to end the holocaust.

Williams' Average Drops

The other marks broken were for total runs in one inning, 16, with the A's contributing a pair, and for most players coming to bat in an inning, 19. Johnny Pesky hit two singles to drive in four runs in the inning while Pitcher Ellis Kinder also got two hits, both singles. There were nine hits and five walks, but only two of the blows were for extra bases—both doubles by Dom DiMaggio and Matt Batts. The Red Sox made 20 hits, tops for the season, but their big man, Williams, was the only guy in the lineup who didn't get a safe ball and his league leading average dropped below .400 for the first time in three weeks—to .397.

The Yankees moved to within half a game of the second place Athletics by winning a 6-5 decision from Washington at New York, although they were outlived by Duke Snider's catch of Joe DiMaggio's smash in which he fell into the stands after spearing the ball, was the game's highlight.

Phil's Move Up
The Tigers defeated the White Sox at Chicago, 6 to 3, with Hoot Evers driving in three runs with three singles after which Chicago rattled with its best hitting spree of the year, winning 12 to 1.

The Phils moved into fourth place with their twin win over the Braves, overtaking the Giants as Blix Donnelly and Rookie Robin Roberts turned in fine pitching performances. Donnelly gave up only four hits in the opener, one a homer by Duke Torgeson. In a homey Alvin Dark tagged Roberts for a homer, but was otherwise stingy in scattering 10 hits.

Using their Rip Sewell and Elmer Riddle anti-Cub parlay, the Pirates moved into second place by trouncing the Cubs at Pittsburgh, 5 to 1 and 6 to 2. Sewell won for the Cubs in the first game, but the Cubs in the opener as Clyde Klutts led the attack with a two-run triple and a single.

Riddle, who chalked up his ninth triumph of the season and his fourth straight over the Cubs, gave up only one hit, a homer by Bill Nicholson, for seven innings. Ralph Kiner's 20th homer with a man abase gave Riddle all the margin he needed.

Weird Decision
The Dodgers won one of the weirdest games of the 20th Century when they put over four runs in the last of the ninth to top the Giants, 13 to 12, after a 12-inning marathon.

Homers by Will Marshall and Bill Rigney, Rigney's with two abase, accounted for the Giant rally. The Dodgers came back with four in their half but a man had been retired. Rookie Roy Campanella smacked the two-run homer, his second of the day, and pinch-hitter Pete Reiser hit a two-run single to break it up.

After losing five straight games, the Cardinals used their stopper, Lefty Harry Brecheen to defeat the Reds, Cincinnati, 8 to 1, but Cincy won the opener, 8 to 6. Hank Sauer hit homers in each game for the Reds to run his major league-leading total to 24. Johnny Wyrostek also hit two first game homers for the Reds.

I'm Just a Ol' Shell, Al, Says 'Jesse James' to Pal

Jennings, Frontier Day Train Robber, 'Positively Identifies' Legendary Bandit

SAN LEANDRO, Cal., July 5 (UP)—The man who says he is Jesse James was recognized as the outlaw today by an 85-year-old former train robber.

Al Jennings, 85, now reformed and a well-known Los Angeles resident, walked into a hotel room where a man known as J. Frank Dalton, 101, lay in bed, confined by an old hip injury.

"Do you know me, Jesse?" asked Jennings.

"You're Al Jennings," gasped Jesse. "You beat me in a gun match once."

"That's him—that's the face, so help me God!"

Two Men Wept
The two men wept and embraced.

"Boys, there ain't a bit of doubt on earth! This here is Jesse James," Jennings said.

Jennings and James, who said he has lived under the name of Dalton since his supposed death in 1882, were brought here for a Fourth of July celebration.

Jennings said he knew Dalton really was Jesse James because he asked the latter some questions about a shooting match that "nobody but him and me could have known."

"I was just a kid then, but I was the fastest gun fighter on the range," Jennings said. "Jesse and Frank James came to the ranch and we had a shooting match. I won it. There ain't nobody but me and one other knows that—and he's Jesse James."

James admitted Jennings beat him. He said he always "boasted my shootin' so's I wouldn't have to shoot."

"I'm just a shell now, Al," said James. "Just a shell of the man that used to be Jesse James."

Steel's Mines Ready, But Is John L. Lewis?

WASHINGTON, July 5 (UP)—Steel companies still hoping to avert a strike, planned today to have their "captive" coal mines ready for operation tomorrow even though they have no contract with John L. Lewis.

However, there seemed little hope that the 40,000 United Mine Workers employed by the nation's 10 biggest steel firms would report for work without a contract. The union policy is no contract, no work.

The National Coal Association estimated that the big steel companies have about a 41-day supply of coal on hand. Industry sources said some mills would have to begin curtailing production before that in event of a strike.
