

Allies To Step Up Berlin Supplies After Day Of 360 Flights

Russians Fail To Put Ban on Air Corridor

3 Powers Put OK On Soviet Currency

BERLIN, July 5—The aerial supply line to Berlin, which hit a peak of 360 flights yesterday, was being stepped up today at the start of the third week of the Russian blockade.

German sources reported that the Russians had established a new series of observation posts to check all flights into Berlin. Allied officials here were unable to confirm the report.

Reports circulated for a time that the Soviets had charged the western powers with violating the rights of the air corridors over the Russian zone between Berlin and the west, the last channels of communications.

Gen. Lucius D. Clay's office said no such protest had come from the Soviets.

Protest Pick Up

But authorities did confirm that the Russians had sent a written protest against picking up their personnel in the U. S. sector. A number of men have been picked up on both sides of the line between the Russian and Western sectors since the current tension began.

So far the air corridors to the west have been unimpeded.

A new flurry of confusion was added when the Western Powers ruled, in effect, that German employees in their sector of Berlin would take up to 75 per cent of their earnings in Soviet-backed currency.

(A Foreign Office spokesman in London said the move should by no means be considered as a backdown in Berlin. He said it would protect the value of the western currency or Deutsche mark, since there was so much trade between the Russian and western sectors of Berlin.)

Truman Puts Day in Missouri At Dedication

Venezuela's Chief Guest on Trip

ABOARD THE TRAIN, July 5 (UPI)—President Truman was en route to Bolivar, Mo., where he and President Romulo Gallegos of Venezuela will dedicate a statue today to Simon Bolivar, South American liberator.

Mr. Truman and President Gallegos left Washington yesterday morning with their wives for the trip to Bolivar. They dined together three times yesterday, chatting about Bolivar and Venezuelan problems through relays of interpreters.

President Gallegos speaks no English and Mr. Truman's Spanish is strictly in the "Si-senor" class.

No Consternation

After the celebration today, President Gallegos will leave the rolling White House and fly to New York. Mr. Truman will continue back to Washington by train, making several platform appearances en route. The first of these will be made late this afternoon at Springfield, Mo.

On his way to Bolivar, the President's train passed through southern Indiana, and its only stops were for servicing.

There was no noticeable political consternation aboard the train when it was announced yesterday that Frank Hague, New Jersey political boss, had swung his state's 36 votes at the Democratic national convention to Gen. Dwight Eisenhower.

"This Eisenhower thing will peter out before the first ballot," one said.

Britain Starts Cradle-Grave Pension Plan

Insurance Covers 48 Million Britons

LONDON, July 5 (UPI)—The most comprehensive cradle-to-grave social security system in the world went into effect in Britain at midnight last night.

It entitles all 48 million men, women and children in England, Scotland and Wales—from Dukes to ditchdiggers—to hospital, medical, dental and optical care.

Under the plan, the government takes over ownership and control of the nation's 1000 voluntary and 1800 municipal hospitals, and becomes the principal—in fact, almost the entire—source of income for doctors, dentists and opticians.

All Must Contribute

The scheme will cost a staggering \$3,282,000,000 a year. Of this, workers will contribute \$880 million, employers \$620 million and the remainder will be taken from tax receipts.

Every man and woman between 15 and the retirement age of 65 for men and 60 for women—with the single exception of married women in the home—must contribute to the scheme.

Regardless of his salary, an employed man will pay 98 cents and his employer will pay 83 cents weekly. Employed women will pay 77 cents a week and her employer, 65 cents.

A person who fails to make his insurance payment is subject to a fine of \$40, plus \$40 for each week he is in arrears.

Housewives and children are covered by the man of the house's contribution.

For these contributions, Britons will receive:

Free doctor's care, specialists service, dental care, hospital care, optical care, artificial limbs, home nursing, maid service if needed on medical grounds, drugs, medicines and optical glasses.

How Danes Beat Rent Control Law

WASHINGTON, July 5 (UPI)—The head of the National Association of Real Estate Boards said today that Denmark's rent control laws have prompted some Danish couples "to start their families before marriage."

Herbert U. Nelson, the association's executive vice president, said in a report on his current European trip that all vacancies in rental property in Denmark are filled on a priority system. Families with children get first priority.
