IU Acquires Veteran Housing

Federal Law Allows Transfer

Times State Service BLOOMINGTON, July 5.—Indiana University officials said today that the school has acquired 77 temporary buildings and 321 trailers by a new Federal law transferring ownership of temporary housing facilities to IU.

The buildings, located at Bloomington and Indianapolis, were built during 1945-46 by the Federal Housing Administration. They were constructed to house war veterans and their families while attending Indiana.

Joseph Franklin, vice president and treasurer of IU, said the bill meant the school would not have to discontinue use of the buildings and trailers in 1949, as required originally.

Mr. Franklin said there was room for 480 families and 700 men in the buildings and trailers on the Bloomington campus, and room for 48 families and 96 single men at Indianapolis.

Daughter, 23, Who Smokes, Finds Mother Is Her 'Problem'

My problem is my mother. She does not think I should smoke, even in my own house, and blows up and calls me a "rip." She says I'm not fit to rear my boys. I'm a headstrong wife and mother of two fine boys. I'm 23 and my husband is 28. We own our own home and are very happy together.

While in her home I watch to see that I do nothing to upset her. In my own home I don't deliberately do things she does not like. One night she walked in while I was smoking. She just turned around and walked out. Afterwards, she gave my sisters and brother a sermon. She later called me a bad name on the telephone.

While she is around I can't correct my boys without her saying I'm yelling and cursing. I remember when my sisters and brother and I were small. She would beat our heads against the wall and throw dishes at us. She told us she wished we were dead and she took a horse whip to my sisters, but never to me.

She goes to church two nights a week and teaches a Bible class. She says she is living a Christian life.

Should I ignore her and continue to take my boys to see her, or should I stay away from her? I'd like to know how others feel, too. I'm always willing to better myself.

Your sons would never understand your stopping them from seeing their grandmother, or your refusing to see your mother. I never would have understood anyone stopping my visits with my grandmother—those trips I made on the huckster's truck which stopped at her house and the candy I've never seen in cities.

Try to understand your family better than your mother has understood you. She grew up in a different generation than yours. Naturally your ideas clash—those ideas of two headstrong people.

U. S. Military Aid Talks Expected to Start Soon

WASHINGTON, July 5 (UP)—Exploratory talks on U. S. Military aid to anti-Communist European nations will get under way this week, probably tomorrow.

Diplomatic quarters said it would be merely a general discussion of how this country might support the mutual defense alliance signed at Brussels Mar. 17 by Britain, France, Belgium, The Netherlands and Luxembourg.

U. S. Seeks to Avert St. Louis Power Strike

ST. LOUIS, July 5 (UP)—Federal conciliators sought today to head off a strike scheduled for tomorrow which would cut off 75 per cent of the city's electric power.

The strike would close two plants across the Mississippi River in Illinois which serve St. Louis, and one at Keokuk, Iowa. Missouri plants would not be affected because a state law prohibits public utility strikes.

FCC Finds False SOS Sent by Teen-Agers

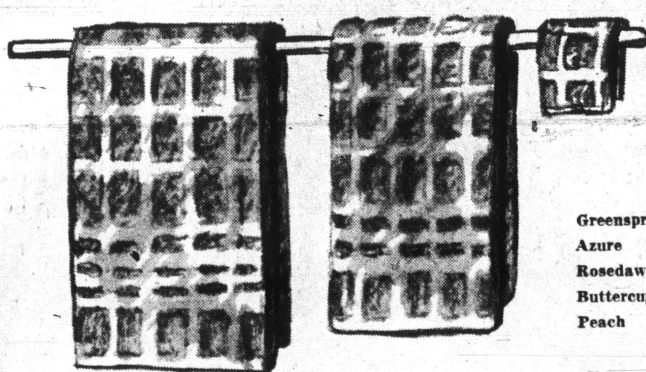
