



Nellie Lutcher's Elusive Huskiness Brings Warmth to 'Cool Water'

'Nature Boy' Contagion Hits England; RCA Puts Out Version for Children

It's really tough, trying to work out any word description of the latest Nellie Lutcher tune, "Cool Water." What Nellie does to this tune, with a husky, hesitating, sometimes indecipherable vocalization, is as different as her "Real Gone Guy" with an equally elusive quality.

"Cool Water" isn't something you like immediately. There's a more than 50-50 chance that it may not even hit. Maybe it'll just turn out to be a second side to "Lake Charles Boogie" the B side. But as for me, I'm getting a second copy right quick, to keep for posterity when playing after playing wears out my present disc.

Other new releases include: RCA VICTOR—If you like Gordon Polk, the kid who did things with Tee Dee on "The Whistler" and "I Met My Baby in Macy's" don't miss "Walk It Off." Is good. Second side is a Stuart Foster ballad on "Let Me Call You Sweetheart."

Latin American music gets a boost with Desi Arnaz vocalizing on "Little Bamba" and "Jipi Japa," both with his band.

A lady from the past springs back on the Three Suns latest disc, "Lady of Spain." Second selection is Artie Dunn and quartet singing a novelty, "I'm Elected," a phrase which has an oddly familiar ring.

Dick James, one of England's most able vocalists, comes up with a disc which proves the contagion has spread overseas. "Nature Boy," teamed with "You Can't Be True."

Incidentally, even the younger set isn't going to be spared the "Nature Boy" philosophy. RCA Victor has prepared a special version, styled for children. Eve Young and the Guild Chorists sing it and the coupling "Time For Your Lullaby" in andromeda style. And by the way Sarah Vaughn, popular vocalist who made an excellent recording of "Nature Boy" will be hurt when she reads RCA Victor's slogan for Miss Young's version as the "only female interpretation to be released."

Back to the "pop" brackets. Perry Como offers "Rambling Rose," a bouncy bit, with a haunting version of "There Must Be a Way."

No runnerup to "Beetlebaum," but still good Spike Jones, is his newest release, "Miss Young's Hand, Madame" and "I'm Getting Sentimental Over You." You'd have to hear it to believe it.

Jimmy Rushing is loud and lusty on "Hey Pretty Baby" with Count Basie. On the flip Jeanne Taylor sings the popular "Baby Don't Be Mad At Me."

MUSICRAFT—It had been a long time since I'd heard the old tear-jerker "A Cottage for Sale," Mel Tormé's latest. The Velvet Fog does wonderful things with the revival, teamed with "If I Had a Girl Like You."

Shep Fields ripples through two old favorites "Diane" and "Where Gypsy Fiddlers Play." Bob Johnson sings vocals on both tunes.

In a rustic vein, Esmerelda offers "Skip to My Lou" and "Naughty Girl."

Russ Brooks gives full baritone to two old tunes, "Angel Child" and "Lullaby."

Harmonizing at a pleasant pace, the King Odom Quartet starts with a bit of humor on "Who Stuck John" and strikes

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Taft-Hartley Congressmen Survive Purge

Labor's Ouster Efforts Meet Little Success

WASHINGTON, July 6 (UP)—Union labor's efforts to drive out of Congress all members who voted for the Taft-Hartley Law have failed to register much success in the 15 state primary elections held so far this year.

With 194 House seats at stake, nine Congressmen who voted to override President Truman's veto of the law have lost out at the primary polls, but labor forces claim to have figured important

four of those cases.

Even these claims are disputed by some Republican and Democratic spokesmen, who insist that there is not as yet one clean-cut case of an incumbent Congressman being defeated because of his Taft-Hartley vote.

Gwynne Loses Seat

The CIO Political Action Committee names Rep. John W. Gwynne (R. Iowa) as its outstanding victim to date.

Mr. Gwynne, a member of the House Republican caucus, is a laborer and a supporter of the Taft-Hartley law. Political experts admit this was at least a "partial labor victory," but point out that the Iowa had opposition from farm and teacher interests also.

Three Republican incumbents lost in Pennsylvania. They were Reps. James P. Scoblick of the Scranton district, James Gallagher of Philadelphia and E. Wallace Chadwick of Delaware County. Union groups have evidence that they helped defeat Mr. Scoblick, but he, like the other two Pennsylvanians, was opposed by the Republican party organization.

Have Spent Personality: Those charged with loitering; Individuals in a confused state of mind with some minor psychoses.

Nonpayment of cab bill: Majority are found to be suffering from syphilitic degeneration of the brain and the rest from split personality.

Traffic violators: Reveals many individuals of limited intelligence.

Runaways: Mainly immatures, pre-delinquent or borderline mental defects.

French police continued their investigation of the \$300,000 burglary. The gold was in transit from New York to the Bank of Indo-China.

Five Years for Murder

PARIS, July 6 (UP)—Pierre Viol was staggering drunkenly along a boulevard one night last October when a passerby Jacques Ghirardi offered to help him home. Viol bludgeoned the Good Samaritan with a bottle, and killed him. Today Viol was sentenced to five years in hard labor for murder.
