St. Meinrad's to Observe Fatima Week; Expects 50,000

ST. MEINRAD, July 10.—St. Meinrad's Abbey is preparing for the visits of 50,000 persons from Indiana, Kentucky, Ohio and Illinois to pray for the peace of the world during Fatima Week, Aug. 14 to 20.

The Rt. Rev. Ignatius Esser, said that he and 23 committees "are working hard to make the celebration in southwestern Indiana the greatest that ever has taken place in Hoosierdom."

The whole program will center about a statue of the Virgin, carved of cedar in Portugal and sent to "travel" about this continent.

6 Appearances Made

Church records tell of six appearances of the Blessed Virgin in 1917 to three shepherd children in Portugal. In the third apparition, Mary, or Our Lady of Fatima, as she is called in this connection, predicted World War II and the rise of Russia.

Our Lady also is said to have promised to convert Russia and avert the catastrophe of a world dominated by Communism if her religious instructions were obeyed.

However, if the religious practices which she urged were not observed, the Virgin predicted that the " scourge of communism would fall upon every continent of the world."

Thus a main objective of all the devout and colorful expressions during Fatima Week at St. Meinrad's will not only be to pray for peace but for Russia to turn to God.

Plan 130 Functions

"A total of 130 functions are planned to take place at the abbey between the arrival of the statue by motorcade at 3:30 p. m. Aug. 14 and its departure also by motorcade at noon on the 20th," said Father Abbot. "From 4 a. m. until 9 p. m. daily there will be some event happening."

The main features will be the outdoor mass at 10 a. m. and the outdoor services at 7 p. m. each day. At all of these there will be a talk by some prominent speaker.

"The Most Rev. Paul C. Schulte, archbishop of Indianapolis, will officiate at the pontifical field mass on the opening day, and Abbot Esser, O.S.B., will be the celebrant for the corresponding mass on the first day. The Most Rev. Joseph E. Ritter, archbishop of St. Louis, will have the mass on Aug. 19 when the sick will be blessed."

Purpose of Event

"The whole purpose of this elaborate event is to bring to the people the peace-plan message of the Lady of Fatima who is none other than the Blessed Virgin Mary, the Mother of Christ and the Queen of Peace," Father Abbot continued.

"A chaotic world is on the brink of ruin. A big world war has helped nothing even though many lives and billions of dollars were spent."

"A peace plan from heaven may prove more effective than the enlisting of more millions of men for war."

"We don't want war. We want peace. Fatima has a message for all men."

Recorder Detects Small Vibrations

Vibrometer Notes Building Motion

SCHENECTADY, N. Y., July 10.—Vibrations in a building or machine, not detected by ordinary means, are measured by a new device small enough to hold in the hand. General Electric revealed today. It is called a recording vibrometer.

A small metal prod which projects from one side of loaf-of-bread-size vibrometer is held against the vibrating object. Inside the instrument's case, a moving sapphire point rests on moving waxed-paper tape. Vibrations are transmitted through the prod, magnified 12 times by a spring, and passed on to the moving point, which records on the tape both frequency and magnitude of vibration.

The tape is moved forward by a constant speed motor. A time mark is made on the tape every three seconds.

Survey Conducted by County Association

More than 300 persons received free chest X-rays during the first week of a three-week survey of five Indianapolis industries now being conducted by the Marion County Tuberculosis Association, according to Mrs. Flora Lagemann, director of the survey.

Approximately 5000 Indianapolis employees will receive free X-rays during the survey, she said.

The general public may receive free X-rays July 23. Mrs. Lagemann stated, when the portable X-ray unit will be used in the survey will be in the downtown area. The location will be announced later.

The X-ray unit will visit Kingan & Co. next week and will be in the Indianapolis Street Railway car barn, 1150 W. Washington St., the following week.

During the past week employees of Citizens Gas & Coke Utility, Langenkamp-Wheeler Co., Fisher Brothers Electric Co., and 46 children from the General Protestant Orphan's Home received the free X-ray service.

The survey is being financed by the sale of last year's Christmas Seals and is part of a long range program in which one out of five adults in Marion County have been X-rayed, Mrs. Lagemann said.

5 Porcupines Born In Captivity
