

## Charge U.S. Planes Fire Rockets

Yanks Say Probe  
Proves Report False

BERLIN, July 16 (UPI)—Russian authorities charged today that American planes fired rockets over the Soviet Adlershof air field last night.

U. S. Air Force officers said investigation of the Soviet charge of rocket firing proved that it was without foundation.

Officials regarded the Soviet complaint as another move in the campaign to build up a case for Russian efforts to block the air lanes to Berlin, the last channels open to the western powers.

Give No Details

The Russians registered their complaint with the Four-Power Air Safety Control Center. They simply said an American plane fired rockets over the field last night, and did not amplify.

Adlershof Field is in the Soviet sector of Berlin, near the terminus of the air corridors from the west where American airmen turn for landings at Tempelhof in the U. S. sector.

Soviet officers at the four-power air safety control center posted notice that Yak fighters would be operating in three areas along the Anglo-American corridors today.

**Mrs. Fullilove**  
Quits Police, Plans  
Travel, Good Time

"I'M GOING to travel around and have a good time."

That was the future planned by Mrs. Lourens Fullilove, head of the Indianapolis Police Department Bureau of Missing Persons.

She retired from the police force last night after 26 years of service during which she saw duty in almost every branch of the department.

Mrs. Fullilove gave no reason for her formal resignation, but in her home at 874 E. Maple Rd., she said: "At last I'm going to spend time at home with my husband. Then, this winter we are going to Florida. I have worked too long."

**MRS. FULLILOVE** went with the force on Jan. 1, 1932, when she was asked to serve as a representative on the delegation by several women's civic organizations. She said she thought it would be "quite a lark."

Born in Clermontville, O., she came to Indianapolis at the age of 22 and married a postal clerk, J. H. Fullilove, shortly thereafter. The couple has a daughter, Mrs. Robert Gates, Indianapolis.

Chief Edward D. Rous said of Mrs. Fullilove's retirement: "She has always been tops with me and she has been here longer than I. We hate to see her leave because she has done a swell job and was very valuable to the force."

**Restraints Strikers  
At Crawfordsville**

**CRAWFORDSVILLE**, July 16—Montgomery Circuit Court Judge Howard Sommer today issued a restraining order against two officials and 10 members of the striking AFL Amalgamated Meat Cutters and Butchers Workmen's Union here.

The ban forbids Local 187, Indianapolis, to engage in violence or sabotage in its eight-day-old strike against the Sam Harris Packing Co. A hearing on a permanent injunction will be held here at 10 a. m. Monday.

Several minor fareups have marked the walkout, which first involved more than 60 employees who demanded pay increases and improved working conditions.


