## Truman Homefolk Set Record on 'Turnip Day'

INDEPENDENCE, Mo., July 27 (UP)—President Truman's neighbors down in the potato bottoms planted turnips yesterday like nobody's business.

It was "turnip day in Missouri," as the President remarked in announcing he was calling Congress back to Washington for the special session on July 26.

An old Missouri saying was: "On the 25th of July, sow your turnips, wet or dry."

Turnip growers pointed out that when July 25 falls on Sunday, as it did this year, the saying is applicable on the following Monday, turnip growers being church-going folk.

DOWN in the Atherton and Courtney bottoms, the potatoes were out of the ground and the turnip seed was going in.

Thomas D. Sheahan, Commissioner of Markets in Kansas City, suggested there must be more turnip plantin' today than there had been on one given day in years.

"We hadn't sold hardly a turnip seed," Mr. Sheahan said, "when Mr. Truman made his acceptance speech. Then, right after his words about 'turnip day,' our sales in Kansas City tripled almost overnight."

## Report Studebaker Net Earnings Up 126%

SOUTH BEND, July 27 (UP)—Net earnings of the Studebaker Corp. and subsidiaries in the first half of this year spurted 126 per cent to \$3,125,554 compared to \$2,357,971 in the same period last year, the corporation announced today.

The increase was \$3.95 a common share up from \$1.52. Sales for the period rose to \$184,174,752 from \$126,634,619 as the number of passenger cars and trucks sold climbed to 114,338 from 94,472 in the first half of 1947.

Production eased to 55,344 passenger cars and trucks in the second quarter from 58,994 in the first three months of the year.
