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Coliseum Rent Totals \$73,900

Paid by Check to State Fair Board

Arthur M. Wirtz, president of the Indianapolis Coliseum Corp., presented the Indiana State Fair board today with a \$73,976.84 rental check for the period covering Oct. 6, 1947 to May 1, 1948. A \$12,000 minimum guarantee previously had been paid to the fair board.

Dick Miller, general manager of the Coliseum Corp., pointed out that the latest check boosts the nine-year rental payments to \$778,199.21, or more than 60 per cent of the \$1,280,000 bonded indebtedness incurred when the Coliseum was erected in 1939.

Pays All Electricity

Mr. Wirtz and associates introduced professional facilities here in 1939 and installed facilities worth \$150,000. In addition to the rental, the corporation assumes the cost for electricity, water and gas used in making ice and lighting the building. The fair board assumes the cost of heating.

The Coliseum Corp. has paid \$22,730.78 in state gross income taxes since the law became effective. The taxable income is exclusive of amounts paid by hockey players, the Sonja Henie ice show and other attractions that have occupied the building by sub-lease. The corporation also has paid \$319,880.53 in federal admission taxes.

Europe if we get price control back," said the real estate salesman.

"Personally, I don't fall for this stuff about there being an emergency. I think the President called Congress back as the opening gun in his campaign. It's just a maneuver and brother it smells."

'Don't Want Price Control Back'

"WHAT DO I think Congress ought to do?" replied the watchmaker. "I'd say adjourn. I don't want price control back.

"Meat rationing would just start a black market. What we ought to do is produce enough stuff and keep it in this country. I say we ought to stay in Berlin. Show the Russians we're not afraid to bum 'em a little if it's necessary. If we do that, they'll back down."

Not Satisfied With Congress

"I'M FOR price control unless it means rationing," said the sporting goods man. "As long as they keep stuff going out of the country, prices are bound to go high.

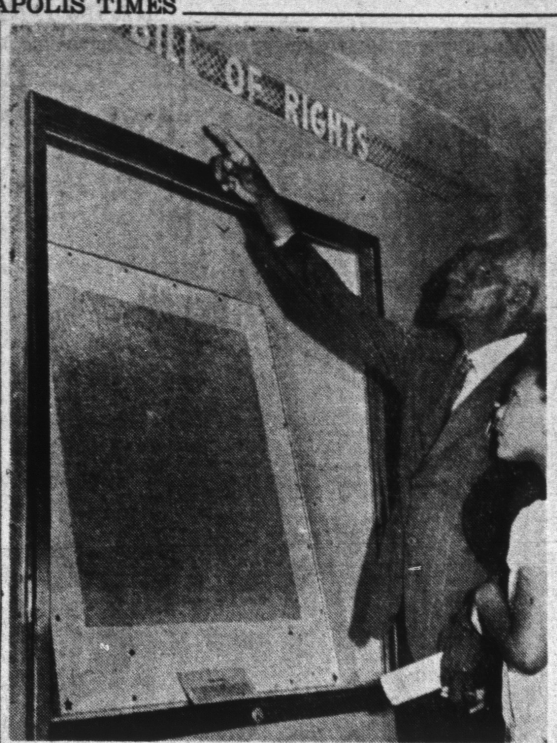
