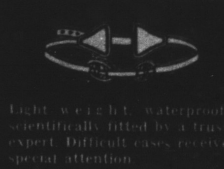


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Local Deaths—Machine Shop Foreman Dies

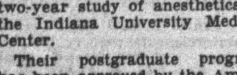
4 Doctors Begin Anesthetic Study



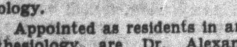
