

Indians Keep Rolling Along, Winning 13 Of Last 14 Tilts

Cal McLish to Hurl Against Saints Tonight

Redskins' 7-4 Triumph Last Night
Shoves St. Paul Down to 4th Place

The Indianapolis Indians just keep rolling along. The victory march now is at eight straight and 13 out of the last 14.

Still leading the league by 10 1/2 games, the blazing Redskins will meet the St. Paul Saints in the fourth and final of the series tonight and Cal McLish has been nominated to pitch by their smiling skipper, Al Lopez.

It's St. Paul's 11th and last regular season game in Indianapolis, where the Apostles have lost 10 straight. But there is no mercy in baseball and the Tribe's will step out there again in an effort to complete the goose-egg treatment on the Saints.

By winning last night, 7 to 4, the Indians shoved the Saints into fourth place, which was really poison to the visitors because it dropped them below their Twin rivals, Minneapolis.

But for the first time in a long time, the Indians didn't pick up half a game or so. It so happened that the second-place Milwaukee Brewers finally won a game in Louisville, after dropping 2 in a row.

Shiners Entertain
Shrine Night was observed at Victory Field last night and a splendid crowd of 9984 was on and despite the fact that the social attraction followed two consecutive doubleheaders.

The Shiners staged an entertaining pre-game program as eight uniformed groups marched around the field. Harry Geisel, master of ceremonies, called for lights out in the seventh inning and it was a colorful spectacle as the huge crowd stood at lighted matches distributed all fans as they entered the park.

Getting back to the ball game, the Indians followed a customary form. They permitted the hosts to get ahead and then used their ears back.

After five innings, the Saints are ahead, 2 to 0, but in the sixth the Redskins went on the upthrust and scored three times on singles by Ted Beard and Les Fleming, a walk to Cully Rickard and Earl Turner's double.

Fleming's Record Fly
The Saints got another run, unearned, off Jack Hallett in the top of the seventh, as the Indians "unleashed" them in their half by lying for a second cluster of "ee markers. The Tribesters manufactured these three runs on a hit, a sacrifice, a two-base run and Fleming's long fly.

That long fly will go down in history field history. With Jack Caslin on third and Ted Beard second, Fleming hit a towering "a mile away" to deep center, where Naylor took after it and made a spectacular running catch near the wall.

But Naylor, out near the vicinity of Cerebrius, was unable to get the ball back in time to prevent a double score after the catch. It was a cinch for Caslin, and Beard had to put on an Olympic sprint to make it from second. He made it, however, in a close play.

Eleven Home Hits
The Indians collected 11 hits. Phil Haugstad and Slick Coffman, the Saints seven off Hallett, was relieved in the ninth by Earl Barrett.

There was a home run poked at night but the Indians didn't take it. Al Brancato, St. Paul cond sacker, socked one out of a park as first up in the fifth. Hallett received credit for the story and Coffman was the one who Hallett charged up 30 rickouts and issued four walks. After walking the first hitter the second stanza, Hallett

fanned the next three, all on called third strikes. He also fanned the side in the third, three up, three down, for six consecutive strikeouts.

Pitcher Paul Erickson, obtained from the Pittsburgh Pirates yesterday, is expected to report to the Indians tonight.

Guldahl Sets Pace Ellis, Marks Share
In Chicago Meet Women's Golf Awards

CHICAGO, Aug. 4 (UP)—George S. May's highly touted top 72 Tam O'Shanter golf course was due for another drubbing today in the second round of the eighth annual All-American golf tourney.

May's mid-summer classic, which pays \$37,500 to pros, men, amateurs and women, opened with an unexpected surprise. Ralph Guldahl, 36-year-old Chicagoan who twice has won the National Open crown, shattered the course record with an eight under par 64.

That performance shaved one stroke off the previous mark set by Leonard Dodson and tied by Guldahl, Byron Nelson, Bobby Locke and Johnny Bulla, and it cost May \$1000, a new-record purse he has offered for some years.

Still Guldahl's record round was good for only a two-stroke lead on the field. Thirty-four pros and four amateurs bettered perfect figures on the 6825-yard layout and Dick Metz, an Arkansas City, Kas., veteran, trailed Guldahl with a 66. He was alone in second place.

Babe Didrikson Zaharias had the Women's Open well under control with a 72, three under women's par. Trailing her were three tied at 76, Patty Berg, Mrs. Eddie Buesch and Grace Leneyck.

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A. L. Pennant Race Is Mathematical Madness

A's Drop From 1st to 4th by Losing One Game; Four Teams in Scramble for American Lead

NEW YORK, Aug. 4.—The American League pennant race today was sheer mathematical madness with teams shifting from first to fourth place on a daily basis and with Cleveland, the Yankees, Red Sox and Athletics virtually tied for the lead.

Yesterday's upheaval found the A's tumbling from first to fourth by dropping a 10-inning decision to the White Sox, 2 to 1, at Chicago. Yet they remained only six percentage points behind the new and probably temporary leader, Cleveland, who took command with a 5 to 3 triumph over the Washington Senators.

The Yankees moved from third into the second spot vacated by Cleveland, by bombarding the Tigers at Detroit, 15 to 3. And the Red Sox moved from fourth to third with a 15 to 8 victory over the Browns at St. Louis.

Paige Wins
Ageless Satchel Paige, making his first start after several successful relief performances, pitched Cleveland to their triumph over Washington, giving up six hits and striking out six before going out for a pinch hitter in the seventh. Ken Keltner hit two doubles and a single and Jim Hegan hit a homer for Cleveland.

The Yankees took advantage of shoddy pitching to breeze in at Detroit, getting 12 hits and 13 base on balls. George McQuinn, Tommy Henrich and Yogi Berra hit homers and Frank Kiusewiczki paced the Reds with a triple and double, driving in three runs. Bill Salkeld homered for Boston.

The Reds made it two in a row over the Braves in the National League, beating the league-leaders, 5 to 4, and cutting their margin over the second place Giants to 4 1/2 games. Herman Wehrmeister pitched five-hit ball to gain his eighth victory, defeating Boston's right-handed ace, Johnny Bain, who was knocked out in the fourth. Ted Kluszewski paced the Reds with a triple and double, driving in three runs. Bill Salkeld homered for Boston.

St. Louis at New York, Chicago at Brooklyn, and Pittsburgh at Philadelphia were rained out in the National League.

Millers Sharing 3d Place in AA

Brewers Stop Losing Streak

Minneapolis moved into a third-place tie with St. Paul in the American Association today and the Twin Cities' clubs trailed the second-place Milwaukee Brewers by only three games.

The Millers edged the Red Birds, 7 to 6, at Columbus last night. The Saints dropped a 7-4 game at Indianapolis. Milwaukee's 8-3 victory over the Colonels at Louisville was the Brewers' first triumph in their last 13 games. That kept them at 10 1/2 games behind Indianapolis. Toledo defeated Kansas City, 6 to 4, at Toledo.

Bill Ayres of Minneapolis had only two difficult innings while giving the Red Birds seven hits. They scored three runs each in the second and fourth frames, taking advantage of five Miller miscues. Minneapolis collected 10 hits off Harvey Haddix who went the route for Columbus.

Southpaw Glenn Elliott of the Brewers scattered eight hits, the big one being Tom Wright's round trip blow which brought in all the Colonels' tallies. Milwaukee broke the 3-3 tie with a four-run rally in the eighth. The Cullopmen got 10 hits off three Colonels pitchers. Louisville committed four errors.

Kansas City outthrew Toledo, 12 to 7, but Earl Reid of the Mud Hens spread the dozen safeties to control the Blues. Toledo scored four of their runs in the first inning. Al Rosen got a two-run homer for the losers.

GOSHEN, N. Y., Aug. 4 (UP)—Demon Hanover and Rollo still ruled the top choices today for next Wednesday's \$50,000 Hambletonian classic.

The two outstanding entries for harness racing's "Kentucky Derby" each stepped a mile in 2:03 over the Good Time track yesterday. It was the fastest clocking posted in the three-year-old trotting division this season.

The Demon, a bay son of Dean Hanover, worked another mile for Owner-Driver Harrison Hoyt of Bethel, Conn., in 2:03 4/5. Rollo, owned by Coldstream Stud, was clocked in 2:05 1/5 for his second mile work.

Will Enter Stud
Three other candidates got under the 2:05 mark in their latest workouts. Bill Strange's Made-Hne Hanover was clocked in 2:04. T. J. Zornow's Adeline Hanover had a 2:04 1/5, and Herman Landis' Meroy Abbey came home in 2:04 3/5.

Meanwhile, Sep Palin of Indianapolis, manager of the Castilian Farm, confirmed the sale of Hoot Mon to Hanover Shoe Farms for \$50,000. Hoot Mon, winner of last year's Hambletonian in the record time of 2:00 flat, was purchased for the same price by the Lexington, Ky., farm in midseason of 1946.

Hoot Mon will soon be retired from racing, Palin said, and will enter the stud at the Hanover, Pa., nursery.
