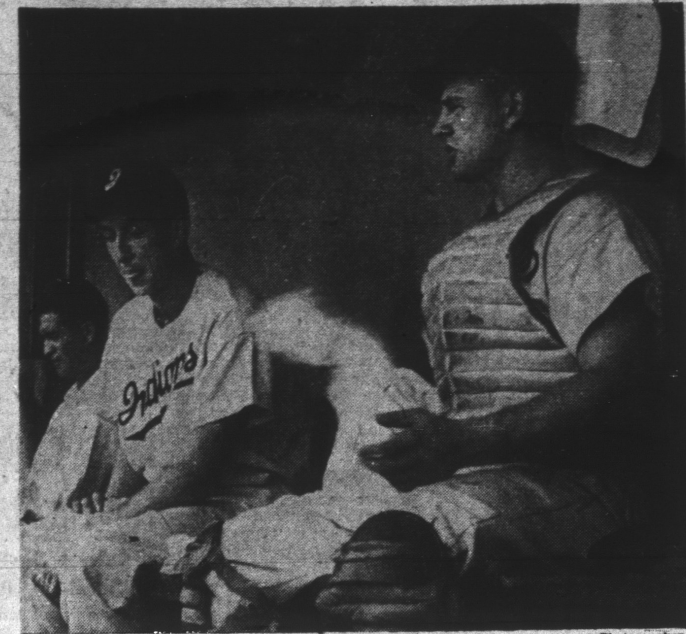

Olympic Films Show U. S. Did Not Commit Foul in 400-Meter Relay

LONDON, Aug. 9 (UP)—Official motion pictures reveal that the United States team did not commit a foul during the 400-meter Olympic relay championship race Saturday, the United Press learned today.

The U. S. team won the race by seven yards over Britain, but was disqualified. Officials charged that Barney Ewell of Lancaster, Pa., went past the 30-yard zone before passing the baton to the American sprinter. For one thing, many Olympic officials were in favor of setting a height limit of six feet, six inches. The American opinion here is in violent disagreement with that of the Yanks.
