

U. S. Hurls Favorite Russ Epithets At Soviets for Bottling Up Danube

Stalin's and Tito's Cold War Due To Get Hot, Say Balkan Experts

The State Department today bitterly hurled back at Soviet Russia the charges of "imperialism" she has made so often against the United States.

It pointed for proof to the abortive 10-power conference at Belgrade at which Russia and its six Danubian satellites yesterday killed all western hopes of reopening the Danube River to non-discriminatory shipping of all nations.

In a blistering attack on Soviet "conduct," the department said Russia used the conference to dictate a set of rules which merely "legalizes its monopoly of Danube shipping." Naturally, it said, the United States, along with France and Britain, cannot accept it as valid.

Bottle Up Trade

The statement threw back at Communist Russia the epithets Russia has used against the capitalist world. It referred to Russia's "economic vested interests" . . . Soviet "extortion" . . . "lip service" to freedom . . . "Soviet imperialism."

Officials said the conference still leaves the 1780-mile river divided into two parts, with Russia bottling up trade in the lower 1200 miles. The upper stream flows through U. S.-occupied Germany and Austria.

Yugoslavia

AUTHORITATIVE London sources today described the shooting of Gen. Arso Yovanovich in Yugoslavia as a sign that the cold war between Marshal Tito and Generalissimo Josef Stalin now become a hot war.

"Now that the Danube conference is over we can expect further developments," those sources said.

"This incident is the first sign of a changeover from a cold war to a hot war between Tito and the Kremlin," Balkan experts said.

Tito announced yesterday that Gen. Yovanovich was killed by a frontier guard when he attempted to flee into Romania. Communists, evacuated the students following in Romania have called on Yugoslavia to revolt against Tito.

Romania AN OFFICIAL Romanian government statement accused Marshal Tito today of unleashing a "wave of terror" against Yugoslav Communists who have remained faithful to the teachings of Moscow.

Great Britain GEORGE BERNARD SHAW said today that the world is threatened by a new war because of the "present babel" of languages.

In a letter to The Times, he said in part:

"Until we clear up our political amnesia, our political oratory and journalism can come to nothing but the pot calling the kettle black."

Asks De Marigny Divorce Test

MIAMI, Fla., Aug. 19 (UPI)—Nancy Oakes de Marigny, seeking an annulment in New York of her marriage to Count Alfred de Marigny, today sought a court test here of her husband's divorce from his first wife in 1937.

Mrs. Marigny asked a ruling on the decree granted Mrs. de Marigny's first wife, the former Lucy Alice Calen.

Her suit alleged that neither Mrs. Marigny nor her first wife were U. S. citizens when they obtained the divorce here in 1937.

Mr. de Marigny was acquitted in 1948 of murder charges in the death of his wife's father, Sir Harry Oakes. The murder of Sir Harry, whose estate was estimated at \$100 million, has never been solved.

Retail Milk Prices Reach Record Levels

WASHINGTON, Aug. 19 (UPI)—The Agriculture Department reported yesterday that average retail milk prices reached record levels this month.

It said home-delivered milk sold for 21.3 cents a quart on the average in 24 of the nation's largest cities during the first half of August.

This was one-half cent a quart above the early July average and about 2.6 cents higher than the selling price in mid-August, 1947.
