Dr. Charles Beard, Noted Hoosier Historian, Dies

**Well-Known Author
Graduate of DePauw**

Dr. Charles A. Beard, native of Indiana who became one of the nation's foremost historians and authors, died today at Grace Memorial Hospital in New Haven, Conn. He was 73.

Dr. Beard, who had written more than 30 books on American history, had been ill in the hospital two weeks.

Born in Knightstown, Dr. Beard was graduated from DePauw University in 1898 and later studied at Oxford University in England.

After leaving Oxford, he attended Columbia University and won a master of arts degree and a doctor of philosophy degree. He joined the Columbia faculty in 1907.

Always ready for a good, hot controversy, his first one was in 1917 when he resigned as head of Columbia's political science department after denouncing trustees as "reactionary, visionless and narrow."

Wife Collaborated

Dr. Beard, whose books are standard texts in many colleges today, was said to have known as much about government in the United States as any man during his time.

One of his standard texts is "An Economic Interpretation of the Constitution."

Dr. Beard forecast a movement in America similar to what later was referred to as the New Deal government in his "The Rise of American Civilization," which was published in collaboration with his wife, Mary Beard.

Later, he entered the controversy over events leading to World War II.

Although an early supporter of Franklin D. Roosevelt and the New Deal, he charged in a book that Mr. Roosevelt secretly committed the United States to military action abroad months before Pearl Harbor and that Japan was "maneuvered" into firing the first shot of the war.

When Dr. Beard was awarded the 1948 gold medal of the National Institute of Arts and Letters, there was a storm of protest and Author Lewis Mumford resigned from the Institute, accusing Dr. Beard of distorting history to suit his own views.

Never Sought Office

Dr. Beard was a keen student of politics but never ran for public office. He was connected for many years with the Russell Sage Institute of Municipal Research in New York and made intensive studies of city planning, accounting and financing.

In 1933, after the disastrous earthquake in Japan, he became an adviser to the Japanese government on municipal affairs.

Besides his wife, Mary, Mr. Beard is survived by a daughter, Mrs. Alfred Vagts, of Gaylordsville, Conn., and a son, William, of Alameda, Cal.

Private funeral services will be held at the convenience of the family, it was announced.

Mr. McDonough died yesterday in his home, 42 Parkview Ave., after falling from a tree he was trimming in his yard. He was 66.

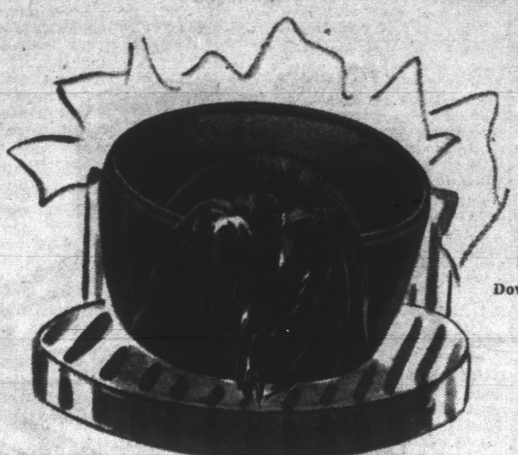
A resident here for 32 years, he was born in Louisville. He was a member of Holy Cross Catholic Church and the Retired Pennsylvania Railroad Employees Association.

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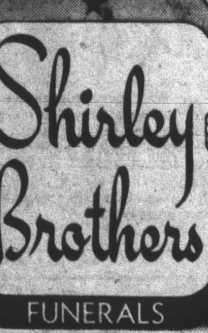
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
