Doctor 'Finds' Mystery Cold Virus at Sea

Yanks Stricken on Mid-Pacific Cruise

NEW YORK, Sept. 10—An indication that a mysterious common cold virus lurks in the mid-Pacific and may be a cause of acute appendicitis was reported today by a Marine Corps medical officer.

The virus, Cmdr. George L. Calvy reported, apparently strikes in the vicinity of the international date-line, and adding to the mystery, only a selected group of men seems to have been affected. He made the report in the *Annals of Internal Medicine*, telling of the men aboard a naval escort carrier being stricken with the cold and then the acute appendicitis.

He broke his report into three phases. In the first, he said, the vessel was in mid-Pacific approaching the international date-line, having left Guam six days before. There had been a decided change in climatic conditions.

Enlisted Men Stricken

Unexpectedly, some enlisted men began to come down with colds. Oddly, passengers and officers were not stricken. Five of those becoming ill suffered symptoms of appendicitis.

In phase two, the same vessel was moving westward eight weeks later toward Guam and in the same latitude and climactic conditions. Again some of the men came down with colds and four apparently had appendicitis.

In phase three, two and a half weeks later, there were more colds, and six men suffered symptoms of appendicitis. This time, officers and others aboard ship were affected.

Find Inflammation

Some operations were performed and the appendices showed some evidence of acute inflammation, Cmdr. Calvy reported.

The report, according to Cmdr. Calvy, covers a period of one year aboard a naval vessel. During the first six months, he said, appendicitis was absent. The incidence rose abruptly, he said, with an outbreak of "colds."

It appears unlikely that an emotional component played a significant role, he said. "Morale aboard was of high order, and the sick call journal reflected general well-being and freedom from the 'disease'."

HARRISBURG, Pa., Sept. 10 (UP)—A labor shortage in one of Pennsylvania's prison industries has forced prison officials to pay inmates overtime rates to keep its multi-million dollar business intact.

F. Herbert Cooper, superintendent of state prison industries, said today that overtime pay was essential to projects at Rockview prison industries which turned out a part of \$2 million in salable goods the last fiscal year.

Margaret Truman Plans To Campaign With Father

President Says She's His 'Greatest Asset'
After Fine 'Reception' on Michigan Trip

WASHINGTON, Sept. 10 (UP)—Margaret Truman is going to quit painting the kitchen furniture and go in for some serious campaigning with her father.

The 24-year-old blond daughter of the President accompanied him on his June trip to the West Coast. It was then that the rather middle-aged and unromantic advisers to the President discovered that Margaret was a big favorite with crowds.

So Miss Truman made the Labor Day swing through Michigan with the President earlier this week. She got such a terrific hand from the crowd along the way that the President described her as "my greatest asset."

Between trips this summer, Margaret has been home in Independence, Mo., with her mother, painting Miss Truman's kitchen and porch furniture, grubbing in a little flower garden by the house and practicing for what she hopes will be an opera debut after the election.

Relaxing on the sunny south portion of the White House after she returned from Michigan with her father, Miss Truman said she was a trifle awed, but completely pleased, over the way people greeted her during the campaign trips.

"Honesty," she said, "it gets embarrassing sometimes."

On trips now, she usually rides in an open car just behind the President's automobile. The crowd sees the President first because he is usually sitting up on the rear of his car.

Then the crowd starts to hunt for "his daughter."

"Hiya, Maggie," is a frequent shout. "Sing us a song."

Margaret isn't about to sing songs during a political swing.

"I don't want my singing mixed up with politics," she said.

Margaret plans to make every campaign trip with her father.

Margaret welcomes her mother being along on trips which involve long public appearances.

"She can wave to the people on her side of the car, and I can wave to them on my side," she said.


