

Week-End Plane, Traffic Accidents In State Cost 9 Lives

Airmen Killed As Craft Hits Utility Wires

Passenger in Hospital With Broken Neck

Indiana's week-end accident death toll stood at nine today, with one person killed in a plane crash and eight dead in traffic mishaps.

Harold Meadows, 50, New Castle, was killed yesterday when the plane he was piloting struck utility wires and crashed near New Castle airport. A passenger, Joe Bono, 40, also of New Castle, received a broken neck and is in fair condition in New Castle hospital.

Traffic accident victims include motorcyclist David Thomas Arnett, 21, Stilesville, stock handler at Chevrolet Division, General Motors. He was killed in a head-on crash with a car driven by James W. Rogers, Bloomington, on Ind. 46 near Ellettsville Saturday night.

Others dead in traffic included: Frank Murin, 33, Whiting, killed last night when his car crashed into a bus near Hammond. Seven others were injured, one critically. Police said Murin was fleeing the scene of another accident in East Chicago after running a red light and striking another car.

Thomas Grissom, 23, Tipton, who died in Elwood, Missy Highway last night after a Nickel Plate passenger train struck his car at crossing in Elwood. One person was injured.

James Shutt, 19, Columbus, O., killed yesterday in a three-car crash on U. S. 40 near Centerville. Six others were injured, police said, when a car driven by Kenneth Chappel, Richmond, attempted to pass another car and crashed head-on with the car driven by Mr. Shutt. A car driven by Donald McBridge, 32, Richmond, then crashed into the rear of the Shutt car.

Truck Hits Tree
William Joe Adams, 22, Bonanza, Ky., killed Saturday when the truck in which he was riding crashed into a tree while passing another car near Silver Lake. The driver, Junior Allen, 21, was injured.

Robert Adams, 12, Walkerton, who died in La Porte Holy Family Hospital of injuries received Saturday when the car in which he was riding crashed near South Bend.

Boyd Marshall, 21, Austin, who died in Seymour Memorial Hospital of injuries received in a three-car crash near Austin Saturday.

Mrs. Hazel Wright, 35, who died in Deamess Hospital in Evansville Saturday night. She was injured Thursday in a motorcycle accident.

Dies in Hospital Here
An Indianapolis woman, Miss Katherine Hendricks, 21, of 1917 W. Michigan St., died in General Hospital yesterday of injuries received Thursday when she was involved in an auto crash.

Several Indianapolis persons were hospitalized today after accidents.

Henry F. Dampier, 67, Salvation Army Hotel, is in critical condition in General Hospital. Mr. Dampier was struck by a car driven by Robert Dennison, 21, of 1122 S. Churchman Ave., as he walked along 1600 Georgetown Rd. last night. The driver said he was blinded by lights of approaching cars and did not see the pedestrian.

Eight-year-old Barbara Pittman, 945 Harrison St., is also in critical condition in General Hospital. The child ran into the path of a car driven by Donald Shinnamon, 27, Tyndall Towne, in 300 Virginia Ave. Saturday, police said.

Thomas Johnson, 2-year-old son of Mrs. Luana Johnson, 25 N. Webster Ave., ran into the back of a car driven by Robert Roell, 53 N. Shortridge Rd., Saturday. He is in fair condition in St. Vincent's Hospital.

Richard Decker, 17, of 1146 Deloss St., was thrown from the trunk of a car driven by Russell McDonald, 19, of 923 Harrison St., when the car swerved to avoid another vehicle on Brookville Rd. yesterday. He is in fair condition in General Hospital.

Hunt 'Mr. Carson' in Baby-Sitter Death

Believe 'Slay' Set Trap for Victim

ST. PAUL, Sept. 13 (UP)—Police believed today that 13-year-old Juanita Wendel was murdered by a mysterious "Mr. Carson" who set death trap by hiring her as a baby-sitter.

The body of the young girl was identified yesterday by her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Maurice Wendel. Identification was clinched by a small red purse found near the body. It contained the note written by Mrs. Wendel telling Juanita where she was to meet "Mr. Carson."

Police said a man who identified himself as Mr. Carson telephoned the Wendel home Aug. 3. The man asked Mrs. Wendel if there was a "Wendel girl who did baby-sitting," saying a friend had given him the name.

Mrs. Wendel made a date for Juanita to meet the man at the corner of Seventh and Rankin Sts., police said.

When Juanita did not return, her parents notified police. Saturday, Mrs. Arthur Schultz of Minneapolis was berry picking with her husband on the outskirts of South St. Paul when she found Juanita's body in a heap of brush. A length of binder twine tied about the girl's neck indicated she had been strangled.

Juanita was one of four Wendel children. Last week Mrs. Wendel became the mother of another daughter.

U. S. Awaits Soviet Tirade At Italian Colony Parley

Doubtful of Russ Accord on Problem, Prepares to Place It Before UN at Paris

The United States, abandoning hope of agreement with Russia on Italy's former colonies, will insist that the problem be placed before the United Nations assembly meeting which opens in Paris next week.

That will be the position taken by Lewis Douglas, American representative, when the Council of Foreign Ministers meets at the French Foreign Office later today.

Russia insisted upon the meeting, but now declares it could not be considered a council meeting because the Big Four foreign ministers themselves will not be present. They will be represented by substitutes, except in the case of France.

The United States and Great Britain were prepared fully to listen to a harangue by Andrei Vishinsky, Soviet Deputy Foreign Minister, when the meeting convened. The last Soviet note on the colony issue set the tone. It charged the United States had in fact violated the Italian peace treaty by refusing to send its foreign minister to the meeting.

Secretary of State George C. Marshall had said no useful purpose could be served at the meeting unless the Russians were prepared to submit new proposals.

About all the meeting can do is to agree to disagree.

Italy

Authoritative Italian government quarters clarified today the Italian stand regarding the nation's former African colonies to correct what was described as an erroneous impression in the United States resulting from Premier Alcide de Gasperi's recent message to Gov. Thomas E. Dewey of New York, Republican presidential candidate.

In his message to Mr. Dewey, Mr. De Gasperi said Italy "is not looking for adventures in Africa, but for work and civil co-operation with autonomously organized African populations."

This resulted, government quarters here said, in an impression in the U. S. that Italy would be willing to accept something less than full return of the colonies.

The message should have referred to "local autonomy," it was said.

Great Britain

King George reconvened parliament after the summer recess with an assurance that the government was doing everything possible to reach an agreement with Russia on the German situation.

Czechoslovakia

President Klement Gotwald of Czechoslovakia and his wife left by plane this morning for Russia to take a "brief vacation in the Crimea," an official broadcast said today.

Faces Second Trial In Trooper Slaying

GREENSBURG, Sept. 13 (UP)—William Virgil Johnson, 18, will go on trial here tomorrow for the second time on charges of shooting to death a state police trooper.

Johnson and another 18-year-old Evansville youth, William Price, were convicted of the slaying of Trooper Herbert W. Smith near Shelbyville in April of 1947. They were sentenced to life imprisonment.

Smith was slain when he stopped the stolen car in which the two boys and two girls were riding. Johnson and Price declined to follow the police car into Shelbyville.

Selized in Cornfield

The four youngsters were captured in a cornfield nearby shortly after the shooting.

Johnson appealed his conviction to the State Supreme Court and asked for a new trial. His attorneys charged that other state policemen beat him. The court held that a confession Johnson signed after the alleged beatings was not valid evidence.

Attorney's will begin selection of a jury tomorrow morning. Price did not file an appeal in the period set aside by law.

The two girls, Mary Ruth Ward, 15, Evansville, and Vera Hornback, 16, Anderson, pleaded guilty to manslaughter charges and were sent to the Indiana Women's Prison on two-to-21-year terms.
