## Rigors of Prison Mature Triggerman and Buddy

Twenty-one months ago, State Trooper Herbert Wade Smith fell mortally wounded from his patrol car on State Rd. 9, north of Shelbyville.

A bullet fired from an automobile containing four joyriding youngsters he had stopped for questioning had nicked the edge of his badge, and plowed into his chest.

The two frightened boys and their girl friends sped away in their stolen car. Hours later they were captured and beaten as they cowered in a cornfield. In jail, they sang "Pistol Packin' Mama" and wisecracked. After Trooper Smith was buried, the youngsters went on trial.

William Price, the trigger man, and William Johnson, his buddy, were given life imprisonment. Their sweethearts, Vera Jean Hornbeck and Mary Ruth Ward, were sentenced to terms of 2 to 21 years.

At their trial, they were cocky and confident after the first scare of being seized by the law had passed.

Today, after 18 months of prison life, they are confident and cocky no longer. A new quietness and sobriety have taken the place of the teen-age jauntiness. In prison, the two boys and the two girls seem to have grown up. For the first time yesterday since prison doors closed on them, the four were summoned back to the courtroom, this time to testify in the retrial of William Johnson.

Johnson asked for a new trial on the grounds that his confession in the shooting was obtained by State Police under threat of physical violence. The State Supreme Court upheld his plea.

It appeared the teen agers would meet again, but that was not to be. The State kept them separated, refused to permit them to be together even momentarily for photographers.

Johnson, pale and very serious, sat quietly at the defense table in the old-fashioned, high-ceilinged room of Decatur Circuit Court. The thronging spectators stared at him openly.

The state began its case. First witnesses were called.

Now 19, Johnson has the air of new maturity about him. His six-foot frame has filled out to 180 pounds on prison diet, and prison hours. At Michigan City, he works in the parole board office as a clerk. He has made a study of fingerprinting. He hopes to learn the field of television and radio, banking on the day he will walk out of prison a free man.

## Cement Shortage Hits New Homes

No Relief Expected Before First Freeze

A shortage of cement is slowly bringing Indianapolis home building to a stop, and there's no relief in sight before the first freeze.

Carl Spickelmier of the Spickelmier Building Materials Co., one of the city's biggest suppliers, said the cause was simply that housing had stepped too far ahead of cement production.

Rush to Best Cold

"The main trouble is demand," he said. "The production of cement is up 18 per cent over last year but we could use 25 per cent more. This is the biggest month in housing. Builders are rushing to get their foundations in before cold weather."

Another building industry spokesman said he had tried to buy "three or four sacks" yesterday but couldn't find them in town.

One large cement dealer said he was getting only 40 per cent of enough to fill his orders. In August there were 162 starts in the county; 32 more than August of last year.

Johnson rose from the defense table and searched for a glimpse of her.

"I just got a sight of Mary Ruth as she walked across the hall," he said. "She looks like a million dollars to me right now. She always has looked like a million to me."

"We can't write, but I still love her and hope she does me."

"The day Mary Ruth walks out of prison, I'll marry her. That is, I'll marry her if I'm out," he said.

Sheriff Earl Marlow took Johnson's arm and led him back to the jail.

## France Accuses De Gaulle Of Forming Illegal Police

Interior Minister Tells Assembly General Has Recruited 15,000 Private Force

The French government charged today that Gen. Charles de Gaulle has organized an illegal private police force of 15,000 men recruited from the ranks of his new party, Rally of the French People.

The disclosure was made in the National Assembly by Minister of the Interior Jules Moch, when deputies questioned him concerning the De Gaulle-Communist clash at Grenoble last Saturday in which one was killed and scores injured.

Mr. Moch said Gen. De Gaulle's force included 5000 men in the Paris area and 10,000 in the provinces. Formation of this private force, he said, was "inadmissible in a democracy."

Mr. Moch said formation of this force was unnecessary because the French government was prepared to protect Gen. De Gaulle. Since the beginning of the year, he said, the government has spent almost 11,000,000 francs (\$38,000) furnishing protection for the general.

Italy

Some 1000 policemen tramped the Sicilian hills today in search for the island's semi-legendary outlaw, Guiliano.

The manhunters were reported closing in on the Monteleone hideout of the man widely regarded as a sort of Robin Hood.

Authorities reported that more than 350 of his followers were arrested, including immediate members of his family.

The police calculated that Guiliano's band had netted hundreds of millions of lire in the last two years through kidnapping, extortion and theft. More than 40 policemen and soldiers lost their lives in combat with the band.

Belgium

Eight Communists were under arrest today following clashes last night between a Communist mob and police outside a theater showing the American anti-Russian film, "The Iron Curtain." Several persons were injured.

The Communist Party sent a delegation to Premier Paul Henri Spaak Monday demanding the film be banned. Mr. Spaak told the delegation Belgium was a free country and that he had no power to take such action.

## Great Britain

The third and last reading of a government bill to curb the powers of the House of Lords was approved by the House of Commons last night.

The bill, which now becomes law, limits to one year the period in which lords may consider—and thereby delay—legislation passed by Commons.

Sweden

The body of Count Folke Bernadotte, assassinated United Nations mediator in Palestine, reposed at the Bernadotte Castle Dragongarden here today.

It will remain until Sunday, when simple funeral services will be held. Cremation will follow.

Mayor Asks Railroads To Repair Crossings

Mayor Al Feeney today renewed demands that railroads keep up the repair of grade crossings within the city.

He said he had noticed several crossings which had become rough and could cause damage to automobiles. He pointed out that railroad companies are responsible for the upkeep of the crossings and requested that repairs be made at once where they are needed.

Warren to Deliver Speech at Evansville

CARM, Ill., Sept. 22 (UP).—Gov. Earl Warren, Republican candidate for vice president, today headed his campaign train toward Illinois and Indiana, promising that the GOP "will not resort to tactics of another candidate who has said he will 'give em hell'."

The California governor was scheduled to make stops here and at Mt. Vernon, Ill., and at Evansville, Ind.
