Fighter Dies Following Bout

CHICAGO, Sept. 30 (UPI)—Kid Dinamita, 22-year-old prize-fighter from the Dominican Republic, died at Cook County Hospital early today as result of a head injury suffered in a bout last night with Bobby McQuillan of Port Huron, Mich.

It was the second death as result of prize fighting in Chicago this year.

The bout was fought on Dinamita's 22d birthday. He never had been knocked out in 51 fights, except for a TKO Aug. 18 when Freddy Dawson knocked him down several times in a fight at Comiskey Field here.

Dinamita died of a cerebral hemorrhage at 4:02 a.m. about five hours after McQuillan hit him with a hard right near the end of the eighth round of their scheduled 10-round match at Chicago Stadium.

The bell saved Dinamita from a full knock-out but he was unable to come out for the next round. McQuillan was awarded the bout on a TKO.

Dinamita was only semi-conscious as Dr. John J. Drannan ordered him to a hospital for further observation.

Dr. Roger Vaughan, night superintendent at the hospital, diagnosed the fighter's injuries as cerebral hemorrhage and said his condition was serious.

4 More Tribe Players Get Major Trials

Fleming, Cassini, Saffell, Johnson Called

The parade of Indianapolis Indians to the Pittsburgh Pirates for 1949 tryouts continued today as four more members of the Tribe's American Association champions received the coveted big league call.

Players involved in the latest transaction are Les Fleming, slugging first sacker; Jack Cassini, the base-stealing king and agile second sacker; Tom Saffell, up-and-coming center fielder, and Chet Johnson, southpaw pitcher.

It was announced as a sale and purchase, but since the amount of cash was not disclosed, it's a fair guess that no money exchanged hands.

The Indianapolis Club is Pittsburgh's triple-A farm and player exchanges seldom call for cash exchanges.

Tryouts Guaranteed

Fleming, Cassini, Saffell and Johnson go to the Pirates from the Hoosier Redskins on the heels of Ted Beard, Pete Castiglione, Earl Turner, Cal McLish and Ed Bahr.

The Beard deal was announced as a sale, but Castiglione, Turner, McLish and Bahr were with the 1948 Indians, on optional agreements.

The wholesale transfer of local Indians to the Pirates is in the nature of a reward for bringing Indianapolis a pennant.

The Pirates are not in a position to use the nine players called up from Indianapolis but all have been promised thorough tryouts in the Pittsburgh training camp next spring.

This comes as a surprise to nobody. The Indianapolis club officially repeated throughout the summer that all key members of the team would get a chance in the majors next year.

But persons close to the Pirate-Indians situation believe that most of the boys will be back at Victory Field in 1949 unless the Pirates use some of them in deals with other major clubs.
