'Keep Peace By Air Power, Prayer Power'

Lt. Gen. Stratemeier Addresses DAR

"We must maintain peace and freedom by remaining ever strong in air power and prayer power," Lt. Gen. George E. Stratemeier told the 48th annual conference of the Indiana DAR last night in the Hotel Lincoln.

The general, head of the Air Defense Command, gave the keynote address in the three-day convention.

The speaker, who spent his boyhood in Peru, Ind., complimented the women on the work of the DAR and asked them to spread his message. "The spirit of any age is the spirit of its women," he said.

In outlining the enlarged setup of the Air Forces, Gen. Stratemeier showed the part women play as members of the U. S. Air Force and through civilian action in such groups as the National DAR Defense Committee.

Reviewing Air Force history of the past few years, the speaker declared, "In World War II, airpower was the predominant factor. Then, on V-J Day our Air Force disintegrated overnight to almost an Air Force in memory rather than an Air Force in being."

He said the low point was rounded two years ago and that now we are striving toward a regular Air Force comprised of 70 combat groups together with 22 specialized squadrons and their supporting elements.

Gen. Stratemeier proved the effectiveness of our present Air Forces by citing the work of "Operation Vittles" which is relieving the blockade of Berlin. It is an example of what "operational efficiency means in terms of maintenance of our national security and the preservation of world peace."
