Halfbacks Lead High School  
Football Scoring Parade

A pair of halfbacks—one a little scabber from Manual and the other a high-stepping right half from Lawrence Central—is leading the scoring parade for city and county teams, respectively, as the prep grid season nears the half-way mark this week.

Frank Mascari of Manual is topping the city touchdown trouper with 36 points, while Byron Weaver, of Lawrence, has assumed a commanding lead in the county scoring race with 66 digits. Mascari has tallied six touchdowns in four games, although held scoreless in two of the games, and Weaver has registered eight touchdowns and eight conversions in five games to date.

Close behind Mascari is team-mate Jack Roberts, with 30 points, tied with Shortridge's Rufus Marks. Marks and Mascari each scored four touchdowns in opening games of the season.
