**Charges City's
Fuel Test Unfair**

**Truck In Overdrive,
Firm Executive Says**

Charges that tests of gasolines used by the Indianapolis Fire Department were conducted unfairly when the high traffic toll for Sep-tember was announced.

State police report 122 lives were lost in accidents on Hoosier streets and highways last month.

The Governor asked police and courts to "crack down onreckless drivers, speeders, unlicensed drivers and unsafe cars as you have never cracked down before."

He added, "If we do not greatly improve, we cannot hold fatalities below 1000 this year. Let every driver, pedestrian, state, city and town policeman, sheriff, prosecutor, attorney, be a man vigorous.

**Trucker Faces
Charges by Girl**

John Brannon, 27, of Bloomington was to appear today in Municipal Court on charges of disorderly conduct, following his arrest yesterday at a rendezvous arranged by State and City police.

Brannon, truck driver for a Bloomington concern, is accused of attempting to entice a 16-year-old school girl to enter his truck Monday on East St. near Wyoming St. to show him directions.

She told police that when she refused, the truck driver made obscene remarks and drove away. She noted his license number and reported the incident to the police.

Officers identified the truck as property of a Bloomington company and found that Brannon was to make another trip to Indianapolis yesterday.

Police were on hand when Brannon finished unloading his cargo of crushed gravel, and made the arrest.

"When I asked them why they had run the test in overdrive they had nothing to say," Mr. Stempel declared.

Yesterday the state oil inspection division reported it had tested samples of Associated gasoline this week and found the product met all requirements of state standards. The division also stated it had made many other tests, previously, and had never found Associated gasoline to be substandard.
