

Truman Chides GOP For 'Quack Cure-All' Theme

Calls 'Unity' Pleas Plan 'To Herd People Into Company Union'

Dewey Prepares for Midwest Swing; Wallace Campaigns in California

President Truman took off through Pennsylvania today in full cry against what he called "unholy alliance" between the Republican Party and big business.

The President planned to make five speeches in the Keystone State and wind up the day with a major address in Frank Hague's Democratic citadel of Jersey City, N. J.

Mr. Truman's Republican opponent, Gov. Thomas E. Dewey, meanwhile, completed plans for a nine-state campaign trip that will start Sunday and will take him into the Midwest and as far south as Kentucky.

Confident of his own election, Mr. Dewey will devote most of his efforts to plumping for Republican senatorial candidates in "doubtful" states.

12,000 Hear Him
During the second day of his three-day swing through the northeast, Mr. Truman was expected to lambast the Republican record on labor and prices again as he did last night in Philadelphia.

Speaking to some 12,000 persons in the huge convention hall, the President charged that the Republicans are determined to herd all the "plain people" together in one big company union and run it for the benefit of the national association of manufacturers.

He also chided Gov. Dewey and his vice presidential running mate, Gov. Earl Warren, on their familiar "unity" theme.

N. Y. Tomorrow
They have all their promises wrapped up in a package called "unity" which they guarantee to cure more ills than any patent medicine you ever saw," the President said. "And they won't tell you any more about what's in that package than a quack doctor will tell you about what's in his magic cure-all."

Mr. Truman will stump upper New York state tomorrow, then return to Washington for a Saturday conference on international affairs with Secretary of State George C. Marshall. Both he and Mr. Dewey will start out for the Midwest on Sunday.

Progressives — Progressive Party Candidate Henry A. Wallace told a San Francisco audience that the Truman administration's foreign policy is "a gigantic Red herring" intended to divert attention from the revival of a war economy.

V-P Candidates — In Chicago, GOP Vice Presidential Nominee Earl Warren hit at "secret deals" between the administration and big business.

Democratic administration has made its foreign policy commitments. Sen. Alben W. Barkley, Democratic vice presidential choice, said in Casper, Wyo., that the Republican policy for the West is characterized by "inaction" and "exploitation."

Crump — Democratic leader E. H. Crump of Tennessee came out for the State's Rights slate of Thurmond-Wright.

300,000 See Him
Despite this, Mr. Truman ignored the civil rights topic, in his speech. He chose instead to assail the Republican platform and said that when he read the platform he decided to "go out and tell the people how many lies it contained."

Mr. Truman had driven 40 miles through Philadelphia and across the Delaware River into Camden, appearing before an estimated 300,000 people along the route.

Timing of the itinerary helped draw the crowds, the largest that have seen him in any city he has visited during the campaign to date. Part of the tour was arranged during the noon hour and he returned to Philadelphia at 5 p. m. when people were leaving work.

Boy Hurls Egg
In North Philadelphia, one of a group of young boys threw an egg toward the President's car. The egg struck a motorcycle policeman, breaking on his leg and splattering the motorcycle. It was work.

Farm Net Run Rings Around Bathtub Sales

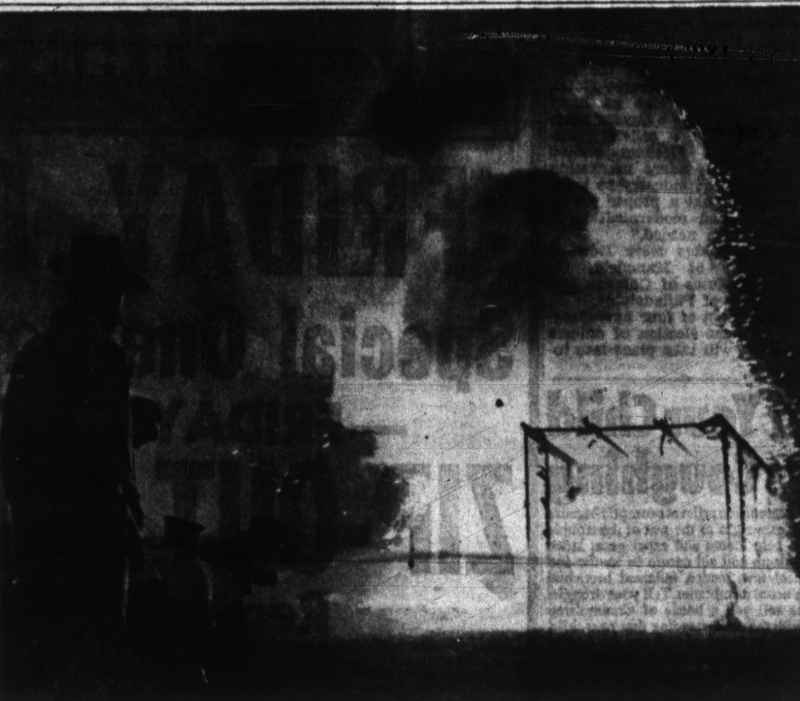

Truman Keeps Pace in East With New Attacks on GOP

President Shies Away From Civil Rights Issue Although Topic Raised Before Talk in Jersey

ABOARD TRUMAN TRAIN IN PENNSYLVANIA, Oct. 7—President Truman is showing no change of pace as he invades the industrial East in his all-out effort to reverse what seems to be an overwhelming Republican tide.

He continues to breathe fire and brimstone against the 80th Congress and he attacks Gov. Dewey for uttering only "vague generalities." He still, however, has not mentioned the Republican opponent by name.

The President also continues to shy away from the civil rights issue although the matter was broached in his speech to 15,000 at Camden, N. J., by Archibald Alexander, Democratic nominee for the Senate in that state.

"We have always admired a man whose convictions are stronger than his own personal advantage," said Mr. Alexander in introducing the President.

"We've seen you meet this issue of civil rights, though as a Democratic leader you did not wish to lose the South. We intend to show you that even if you lose the South you can still win the presidency. We admire men of your courage."

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Clear Sailing Seen For Radio Signals

WASHINGTON, Oct. 7—Radio broadcasts from London, Berlin and Moscow will come through clearly the next four days, the National Bureau of Standards here predicts.

Short-wave radio signals, in fact, may be expected to come through fairly well or better throughout most of October. At this point, no radio trouble is expected for more than two weeks.

Weak signals and fading may mar reception Oct. 22 and 23, also Oct. 27 to 29, the bureau states. But additional observations are needed before radio experts can be sure that these storms in the ionosphere actually will materialize. They are expected because signals were disturbed the last time these same areas of the sun's disk passed the sun's central meridian.

Satira to Thank Cuban President for Pardon

HAYANA, Oct. 7 (UP)—Chicago night club dancer Patricia (Satira) Schmidt was scheduled to pay a visit to President Ramon Grau San Martin today to thank him for a presidential pardon from her 15-year prison sentence for slaying Chicago socialist John Lester Mee.

Although she was scheduled to leave Havana today by plane for her home in Toledo, she delayed her departure until tomorrow.

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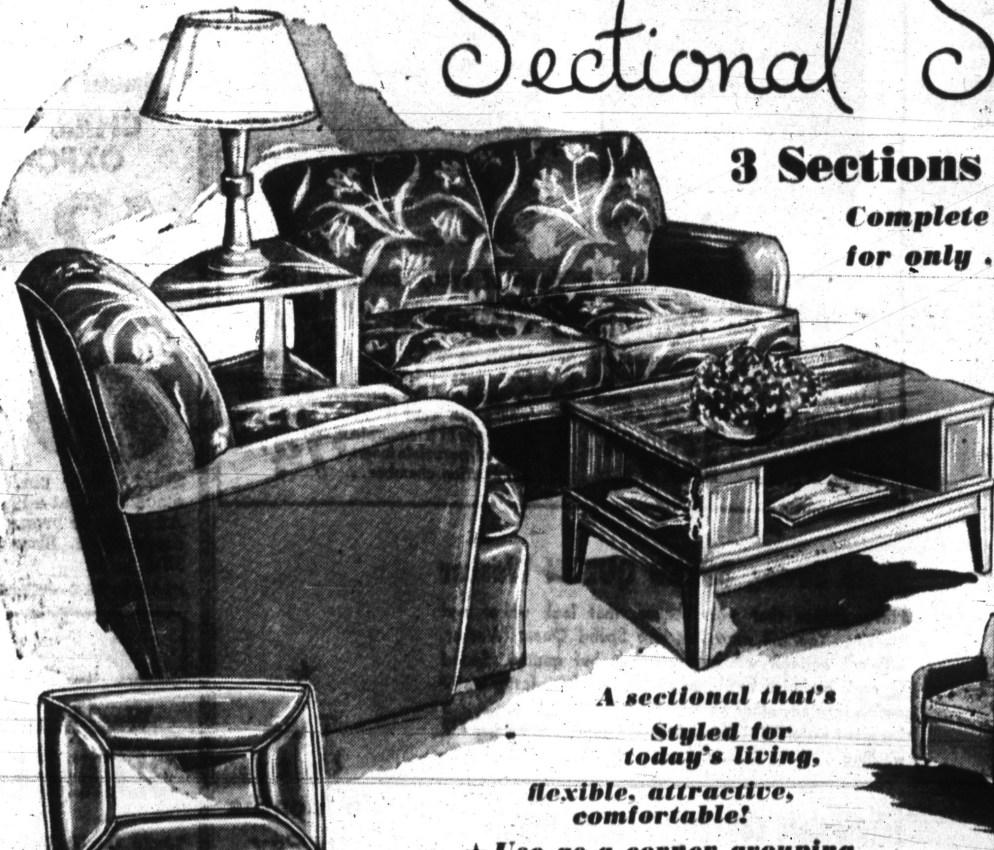
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
