## Juvenile Court Change Urged By Mrs. Barr

### Voters League Hears Discussion

An improved method of selecting the judge of Juvenile Court and the removal of the arbitrary ceiling of the present law on assistance to dependent children was outlined as needed 1949 child welfare legislation by Mrs. Joseph W. Barr yesterday at a general meeting of the Indianapolis League of Women Voters. Her report was the result of a study by the legislative committee of the League.

Mrs. Barr, chairman of the child welfare committee of the local group, pointed out it would require a change of the present election law to place the judgeship on a non-partisan basis. She also said the change would apply only to Marion and Lake counties. She also recommended legislation for the selection of court staff members on a merit basis.

Under the present Assistance to Dependent Children law the maximum allowance for a mother and one child is \$35 a month; mother and two children, \$48; mother and three children, \$66, and each additional child, \$18. In June, 1948, the state average allowance per child was \$21.37 per month.

### Adequate Relief Will Cost Less

It was pointed out that this present amount is insufficient to keep a needy or dependent family. Most often the result is a broken family. Adequate relief to families in distress costs the taxpayers less, is the best insurance against juvenile delinquency and broken homes and lessens the institutional burden.

A petition to councilmen backing the Chamber of Commerce proposal for a new smoke ordinance was signed by members and their guests.

## Beauty— Dandruff Control Found

WHAT IS MORE annoying than dandruff? Most common of infections, dandruff has had the least amount of satisfactory scientific study.

Now, however, a beauty specialist has produced a new formula for the control of dandruff, utilizing an active ingredient heretofore unknown.

In liquid form, the solution is applied directly to the scalp where the infection is lodged, either parting the hair and applying with an eye-dropper or using a cotton pad. The head should be gently massaged, particularly in the infected area. Allow the liquid to remain on the scalp and repeat this process every day until the condition is controlled. Once a week is often enough after this.

Re-infection is so possible, from hats, pillows, chair backs or even a comb and brush. A weekly treatment will help avoid the recurrence of dandruff.

CORRECTING a scalp infection is the first step to lovelier hair, but other factors, too, are important for that glamorous coiffure. Hair is something like the skin. The same life-giving elements

With the use of this new hair preparation and gentle massage, annoying dandruff may be controlled. Applied with an eye dropper or cotton pad, the liquid should be used daily until condition is improved.
