Sea Believed Key To Raw Materials

Atom Energy Visioned As Peaceful Servant
WILMINGTON, O., Nov. 11 (UP)—David H. Deitz, Science Editor of Scripps-Howard Newspapers, said last night that within 50 years industry would be going to the ocean for its raw materials and that within 20 years atomic energy would be a peaceful servant of the nation.

Mr. Deitz was addressing the Wilmington College Conference, "building for a better world," which started yesterday and will continue until Saturday.

He said that a small atomic energy plant was now functioning in Schenectady, N. Y., and that within 20 years atomic energy would be practical for use in industry.

"As the earth's minerals are used up, science and industry will find methods of extracting them from the oceans," Mr. Deitz added.

He said we now have "plastics as fine as silk, thin as tissue, elastic as rubber, light as aluminum and transparent as glass."

"Soon we will have plastics combining all these qualities in one product," he added.

The rule for polling of bar members on the matter of reappointments in the municipal or magistrate's courts of the County was adopted by the Board of Managers of the association last week.

Plan Secret Ballot
Results of the poll, which will be by secret ballot, will be presented to the Governor, who has authority to fill the vacancy at the end of Judge Champ's term on Dec. 31. The results also will be made public.

No poll will be taken when an incumbent notifies the association 60 days before the expiration of a term that he is not a candidate for reappointment.

Levi Tax Evasion Trial in 4th Day

Defense Ready To Make Stand

The jury trial of Abraham Levi, president of the Elwood Iron and Metal Co., entered its fourth day in Federal District Court today.

Levi is charged with corporation and individual income tax evasion from 1943 to 1945, but his defense contends that the government did not allow all the credits due in the tax computations.

Chauncey Ebinger, special agent with the intelligence unit of the internal revenue department, yesterday testified that company invoice figures showed larger amounts than entries on the company books.

Cites Huge Mark Up
Mr. Ebinger also testified that steel purchased by the Elwood Iron and Metal Company had been sold at a 174 per cent mark up.

In explanation of the difference in bookkeeping and invoice figures, Mrs. Elizabeth Bonham, company bookkeeper, testified that in some instances only company profits were recorded.

She testified that Levi often made purchases with personal funds, then reimbursed himself when he made the resale. The money remaining after the reimbursement was entered on the books, she said.

The defense is expected to take over the trial today.

Hoosier Figures in Ft. Sheridan Escape

FT. SHERIDAN, Ill., Nov. 11 (UP)—Military and civil police today sought two army prisoners who escaped from Ft. Sheridan last night after overpowering a guard.

The fugitives were Pvt. Beecher Sanders, 20, Tarpin, Va., and Pvt. Robert N. Shipley, 17, Vincennes, Ind.

Military authorities said the prisoners took a gun from the guard and forced him and another prisoner to accompany them as far as Lake Forest, Ill.

New Democratic Majority In House Plans Patronage

Indiana's new Democratic majority in the lower House of Congress has organized machinery for control of some 300 postoffice jobs in the state, agreed on platform policies and received instructions on operation of Washington offices.

Five of the state's seven newly elected Democratic Congressmen conferred for the first time since

the election as luncheon guests of Frank M. McHale, Democratic national committeeman, at the Athletic Club yesterday.

The session was advertised to the press, but when reporters arrived there were dinner plates and chairs only for the Congressmen-elect, their hosts and special

guests—a mute way of announcing that it was a closed meeting. However, the Congressmen-

elect said there was nothing secret about it, only a technical briefing for the new members of Congress.

Mr. McHale announced to the congressional delegation that most of the federal patronage in Indiana will be turned over to

them. Each Democratic Congressman will fill the jobs, most of them postoffice patronage, in his own

district and the State Democratic Committee and Mr. McHale will make appointments in the four districts where Republicans were elected.

Congressmen-elect who attended the meeting were Andrew Jacobs, Indianapolis, 11th district; Thurman C. Crook, South Bend, third district; Edward A. Kruse Jr., Ft. Wayne, fourth district; John Walsh, Anderson, fifth

district, and Winfield K. Denton, Evansville, eighth district.

Rep. Ray Madden, Gary, first district, and James Noland, Bloomington, seventh district, were unable to attend.

Special guests included Governor-elect Henry F. Schricker, State Democratic Chairman Ir-

Haymaker and Ralph Roberts, Rockport, assistant clerk of the House who is expected to be made chief clerk under the Democratic majority next January.

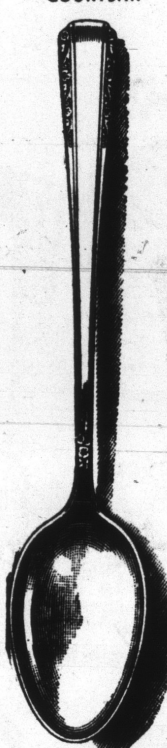
