

Henry Strauss, Barber, Dies at 59

Practiced Trade Here Since 1910

Henry Strauss, Indianapolis barber for many years, died yesterday in the Marion County Tuberculosis Hospital, Sunnyside. A native of Cincinnati, he was 59.

Mr. Strauss had been an Indianapolis resident since 1910. He recently operated his own shop at Fairfield and College Aves. Prior to that he had been a barber in the Marrott Hotel and formerly had been the children's barber at L. Strauss & Co.

In addition to his wife, Flossie, he is survived by three sisters, Mrs. Dennis Barnett, publisher of the Indiana Jewish Chronicle and with whom he had lived before his illness; Mrs. Ida Swain and Miss Julia Strauss, all of Indianapolis, and three brothers, Morris Strauss, editor of the Indiana Jewish Chronicle, and Edward Strauss, both of Indianapolis, and Charles Strauss, Washington, D. C.

Services today in the Aaron-Ruben Funeral Home were to be conducted by Rabbi Mandor Fruchtman and the Rev. A. Portnov. Burial will be in the Central Hebrew Congregation Cemetery.

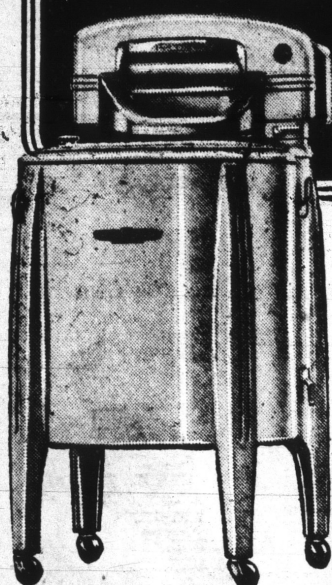

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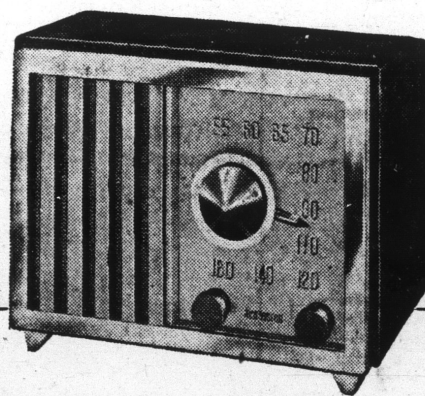

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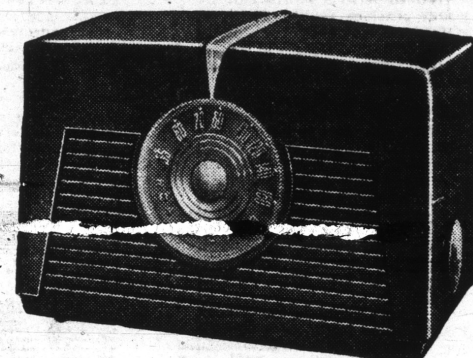
