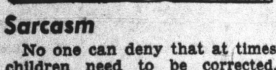

It is hard for them to be criticised or punished. Resentment over what seems unfair treatment is not uncommon. Conscientious parents have a hard time in knowing what is best to do.

Of one thing we can be sure. Sarcasm may be effective in squelching the young sprout when he seems to be getting too big for his britches but it wounds too deeply to justify its use.

Such comments as "You really think you're something, don't you?" when Junior has been telling of some exploit at school, or "What a wonderful help that was!" to the youngster who drops a dish that he was washing, are examples of the kind of sarcasm that has no place with children.

So, though you're tempted when something irritating happens, it will pay to put the curb on sarcasm. If it's used often, the child's self-esteem will be badly battered.
